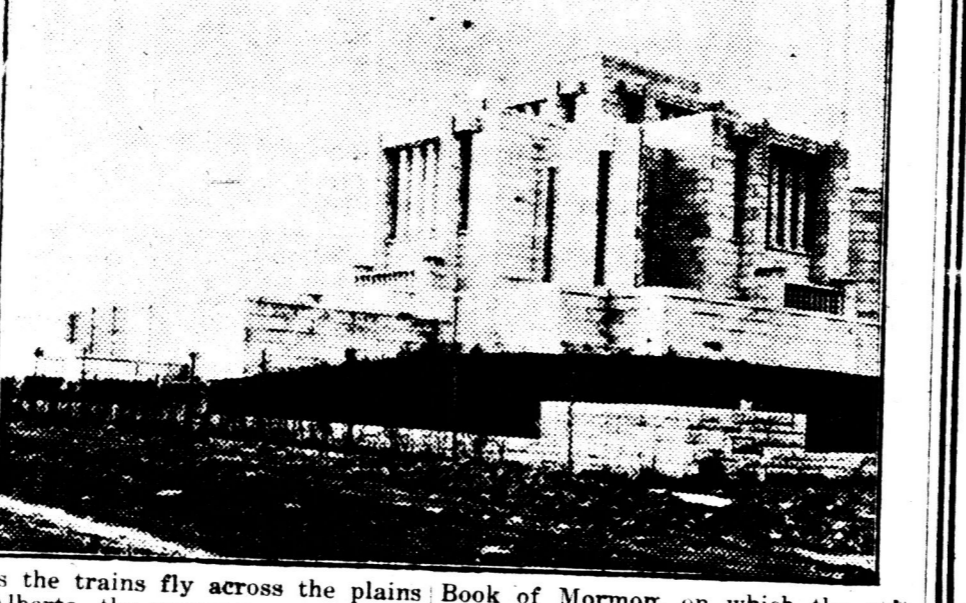

Mormons' Prairie Temple




As the trains fly across the plains of Alberta, the passengers see in the distance the sun shimmering upon the white walls of a building of exquisite proportions, standing in a weird loneliness, that provokes the curiosity. The mystery is explained when the train approaches the little village of Cardston, typical of the prairie. It is the Mormon temple, which has occupied many years in building and cost over a million dollars. The picture shows its unusual style of architecture. There are 20,000 Mormons in Canada, and most of them live in and around the village of Cardston. The village itself has a population of 1,600 and is surrounded by a number of smaller settle-ments. Mormonism has a history of less than a century, the founder, Joseph Smith, being born in 1805. The Book of Mormon, on which the cult is based, published in 1830, was alleged to have been translated from a series of gold plates containing the early history of America, since the dispersion at Babel, their hiding place being revealed to Smith by an angel. The plates were also returned to the angel as soon as the translation was made. Smith at one time offered himself as a candidate for the presi-dency of the United States. Accord-ing to the Encyclopaedia Britannica, Mormons no longer claim to be a Christian sect, any more than they claim to be Mohamedans. Accord-ingly to their doctrine, the supreme ruler is Adam, while they group Christ, Mohammed, Joseph Smith and Brigham Young as divinities, al-though they believe that men must acknowledge Christ's atonement.
