The meeting opened by singing the opening ode, followed by the Lord's Prayer. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

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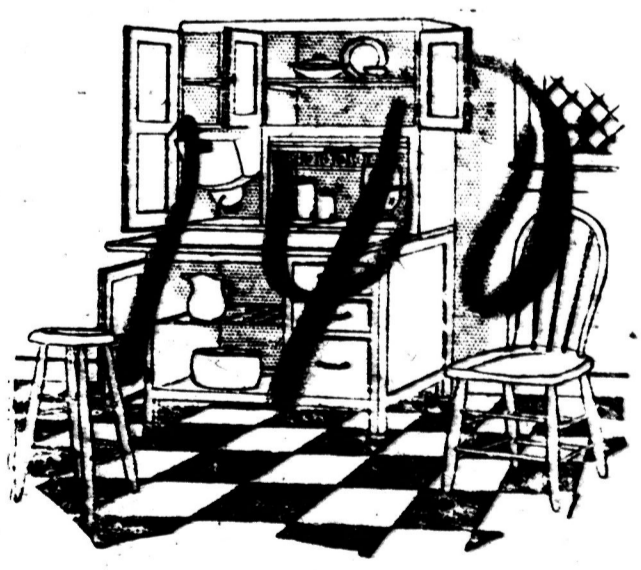
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
