At the annual meeting of the Black Creek Creamery company, Les Marshall, the manager, announced that it had been sold to the Caledonia Creamery company and would be dismantled.

Mr. Marshall will be the manager of the branch of the Caledonia company here.

This news, while not so much a surprise to many, because of rumors to that effect having been circulating in Port Dover for many weeks, was received with regret. Many of those present at the meeting voiced their regret at the passing of the institu-

tion that had served them so well and for a comparatively long period. But they took opportunity to let Mr. Marshall know that they appreciated his courteous and kindly treatment, as shown them during the years he has had charge of the Black Creek Creamery. They thanked him for the way in which he had looked after their individual interests and for the square deal he had always given to everyone. While they regretted his departure from the old place, they wished him success in his new home in Jarvis, and promised him their continued support and patronage. A representative from the Caledonia Creamery company was present at the meeting and assured the farmers that his company was anxious to maintain the service that had been given by the Black Creek management.

One of the most charming of these is Burrington Combe, whose rocky sides are pierced by numerous caverns, anciently used as places of sepulture, one of which, when discovered, contained fifty skeletons in orderly array. This combe leads up to the crest of Black Down, the highest point of the Mendips. Near here, some a few miles from Bristol, nestles the pretty village of Blagdon, "And yonder Blagdon in its sheltered glen"
Sits pensive, like a rockbird in its cleft,"

with its grey old church and quaint little cottages built of the limestone of the district, to which roses and creepers cling so lovingly and ferns of all kinds root themselves in the chinks of the walls; indeed, the very stone itself bleaches or browns under the storm and the sun into many a tender diversity of color. The old church is now undergoing extensive renovations, but it will ever be fragrant with the memory of the Rev. Augustus Montague Toplady, who from 1762 till 1764 was curate-in-charge of the parish. On one occasion, whilst walking amongst the hills, he was overtaken by a thunderstorm and compelled to seek refuge in a small cleft in a rock, now known as the "Rock of Ages;" for here, as he sheltered from the fury of the elements, came to him the beautiful thoughts which he afterwards embodied in the grand old hymn which we all love and know so well. When it appeared in print it at once became a general favorite throughout the length and breadth of the land.

More than one hundred and fifty years have passed away since Toplady left Blagdon, but his memory is still revered in the village, and not long since a brass plate was placed in the church bearing the following inscription:

In Memory of
AUGUSTUS MONTAGUE TOPLADY
Clerk in Holy Orders,
Author of the hymn "Rock of Ages,"
Curate in sole charge of this Parish,
1762-1764.
Whose remains now lie buried beneath
Whitefield Memorial Church, London.

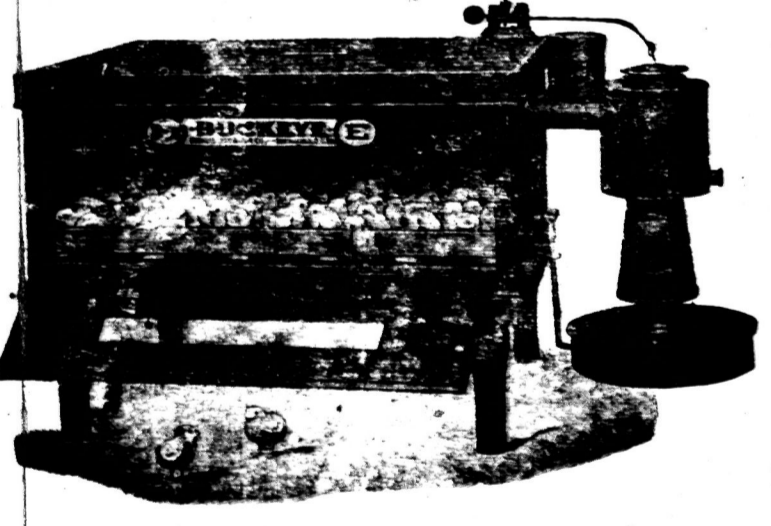
