ADVISE ON HIGHWAYS
 A bill providing for the appoint-
 ment of a "Highway Advisory Board"
 was introduced in the Legislature by
 Premier Ferguson on behalf of the
 Minister of Highways. The proposed
 Board, which is to consist of three
 members of the House, is intended
 to advise the Minister of matters re-
 lating to the highway needs of the
 Province and to assist him in keep-
 ing in touch with the requirements of
 all sections. A clause in the bill also
 proposes to make members of munici-
 pal councils ineligible to sit as mem-
 bers of suburban area boards.
