NO ELECTION FOR WALPOLE

Reeve Clark Is Again in Office Without Opposition - Old Council Back

There will be no election in Walpole township.

At the nomination Monday the old council was elected by acclamation. W. G. Clark, the present reeve, was the only man nominated for that office.

Deputy Reeve W. J. Saunders and Samuel Fleming were nominated for deputy reeve, but Mr. Saunders withdrew. W. B. Shoup, Frank Laidlaw, W. N. Waterbury, Emerson Nei and Mr. Snowden withdrew, allowing the old councilors to go back by acclamation.

Following the nominations the reeve and deputy reeve reviewed the work that had been done by the township and county councils during the last year.

FIRST DEPOSITOR IN THE NEW BANK

Master Billy Parkinson Was Found Waiting When the Doors Were Opened

Master Billy Parkinson, son of Charles Parkinson, was the first depositor in the Jarvis branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

Billy was waiting when the bank opened Wednesday morning and explained he wanted to be the first to put money in the bank under the new regime caused by the amalgamation of the Bank of Hamilton and the Bank of Commerce.

The amalgamation became effective Wednesday morning. No change in the staff is anticipated. In fact, so far as the public is concerned, there will be practically no difference.

The new bank, as the old, will do a general banking business, but now the Bank of Commerce will have a paid up capital of more than \$20,000,000 and a reserve of an equal amount, making the combined institutions one of the strongest banks in Canada.

JARVIS COUNCIL IS UNCHANGED

No Person Is Nominated to Oppose George L. Miller For Reeveship

Jarvis will have the same council as last year and without an election.

George L. Miller, the present reeve, was the only man nominated for reeve. The councillors nominated were Ivan W. Holmes, R. Shaver, N. Pond, John Wadham, William Parkinson, C. S. McCarter and Fred Reicheld. Mr. Parkinson, Mr. McCarter and Mr. Reicheld withdrew, leaving the former members of the council back in their places without opposition.

Following the nominations C. S. McCarter called attention to the annual statement of the village explaining that he noticed several persons, such as the auditors, members of the board of health, the health officer and some others obtained fees while, when he was in the council the work was done gratis.

Ivan W. Holmes explained that the provincial act now provides for the fees which Mr. McCarter mentioned.

William Parkinson explained the money received by him for building sidewalks. He had heard of some criticism. He told of the money paid out for gravel and labor and explained that he actually received \$5 a day for his work and that a few years ago when an outside contractor put down walks here he received \$10 a day and an assistant \$4.50 a day for doing the same work as he himself. He also showed that the walks here cost two cents a square foot less than similar work in surrounding villages.

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J. KING BURIED IN PORT DOVER

Held Many Municipal Offices in Both Township Village

John Young King, of Port Dover, was buried Sunday in Oakwood cemetery, Simcoe.

He was the father-in-law of Mrs. John C. King, a sister of Mrs. Helen Steel, of Jarvis.

Mr. King was born in Scotland 82 years ago, and married to Jessie Campbell, of Aberfeldy, Scotland, in 1877. They emigrated in 1880 and lived in Woodhouse township, Norfolk county, for about 33 years, when they removed to Port Dover.

He was Tax Collector and Assessor for both the township and village for several years. He was a regular attendant of Knox Presbyterian church, of which he was an elder. He always took a lively interest in public affairs. He had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. King leaves a widow, five sons: Robert H., of Okanagan Valley, B.C.; James, of Detroit; Samuel, of Simcoe; John C., Clerk, of Woodhouse township; Edward, of Pontiac, Mich., and one daughter, Mrs. (Captain) C. O. Macdonald, of Port Dover.

Woodhouse Township Council attended the funeral in a body.
