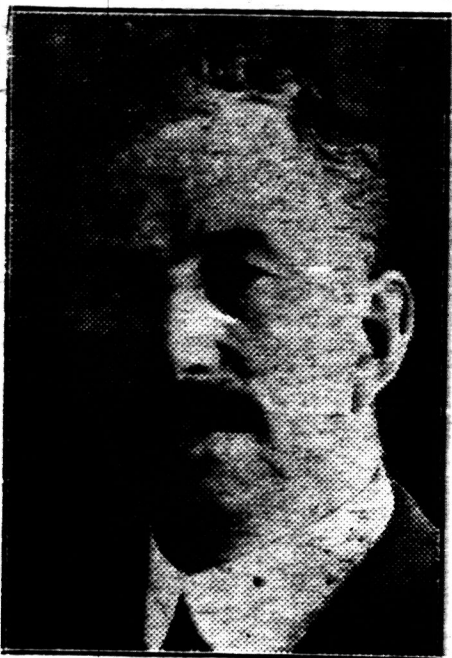

Britain has reached a new epoch in her history. The steady development of democratic principles has come to the point where the Labor party will assume the reins of government and the parties, which in their infancy were regarded as rank opponents of the then existing order of things, are now in turn regarding with dismay the probable ascension of the extreme democratic party of this day. At the head of the party is Ramsay MacDonald, a character at once interesting and commanding, and not a little mysterious. Endowed with natural grace and good looks and an undeniable charm when he chooses to exercise it, he is also stern and bitter in his outlook. A tendency toward charm and culture he inherits from his mother, but all his life he has fought with the conditions in which he found himself. He is not a laboring man, in the sense of manual labor, but has been a writer on labor and socialistic subjects and a paid leader of labor. One of the saddest experiences of his life was the loss of his wife in 1911. She was a daughter of Dr. J. H. Gladstone, F.R.S., a close relative of the great statesman, William Ewart Gladstone, and a niece of Lord Kelvin, but as a young girl grew interested in socialism and married the handsome and brilliant young leader. She left him three young daughters, Sheila, Joan and Isabel. During the war Ramsay MacDonald was pro-German in his attitude and declared Britain equally to blame for the conflict. He represents the extreme socialist views, but steps short of communism. Will this man be called by the King to form the government of Great Britain? Capital levy, whereby fortunes over \$25,000 would be called upon to subscribe to a fund to wipe out the debt of Britain, was Labor's strongest election plank. The prospect of power, has, however, already modified the party's view upon this subject. Perhaps the best balanced view of the present British political situation was given by Sir John Martin Harvey, now in Canada, who participating in a Labor meeting said: "It will give them a chance to experience for themselves many things, and even should they not succeed in carrying out, their experiences will make their future criticism less violent and more constructive. It is one thing to talk of solving problems and quite another to solve them when the actual question arises. I rely, however, on the sanity and common sense of the British workman to prevent anything of detriment to the interests of the country at large taking place through a Labor Government. The only bad effect which I can foresee, which might occur, would be an influence upon credits." Capital levy has been attempted, and has failed, in seven European countries.
