Dominion Day

The Fathers of Confederation who after great difficulty finally brought into being the confederation of the eastern part of the northern half of the American continent into the Dominion of Canada on July 1st, 1867, would have been possessed of prophetic vision if they had had any idea of the development of the Dominion in its present size and importance in agriculture, trade and commerce, and general prosperity.

The setting apart of a day in each year for the commemoration of this great event in our national history is most appropriate and fitting. Unfortunately, however, the day passes each year without anything of an appropriately commemorative or historically educative character.

The 4th of July, the similar nationally historic holiday of the United States, is a day of flag waving and patriotic exhilaration, and while it may not be desirable to go to such lengths of enthusiasm and patriotic exuberance as is customary with the Yankees, it would be well if Dominion Day were made to really mean something to Canadians other than a mere holiday.

From a few unimportant provinces Canada has become a nation with national aspirations, and has achieved an international recognition as a nation within the British Empire. She is possessed of almost unlimited natural resources. With the opening up and settlement of the great west, she has become the leading exporter of grain, and in commerce she has developed a manufacturing industry of great importance. While business may not be as prosperous as might be wished, there is nothing wrong with the prospects of the country, and present conditions which have followed the Great War will soon right themselves, and an era of good business and prosperity ensue, and there is no reason for pessimism.

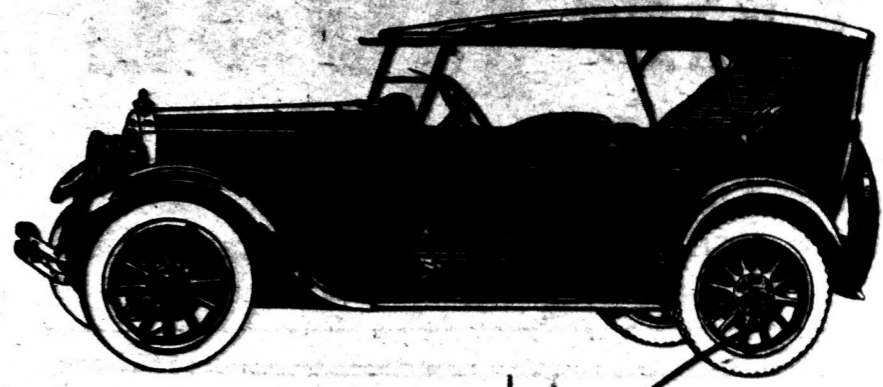

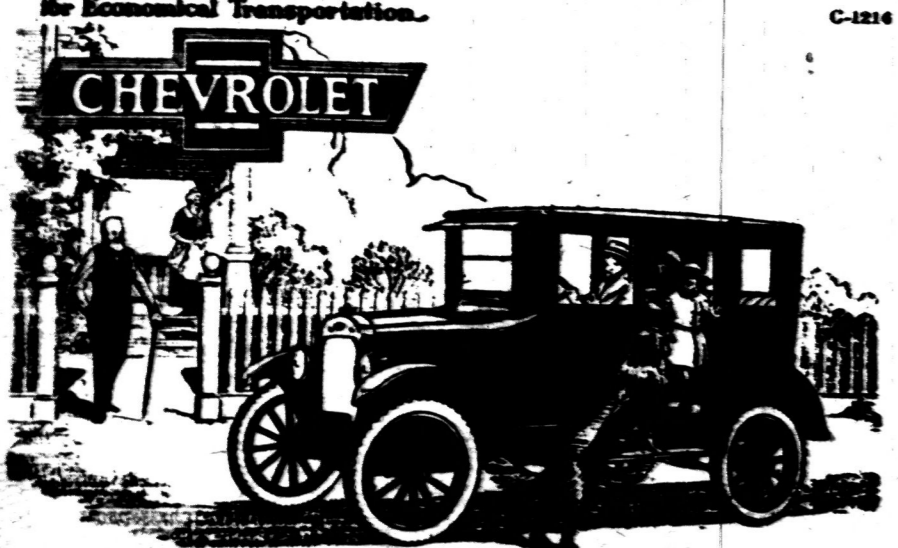
