## Legislating a Destiny

A grave and reverend eastern U. S. magazine says that passing laws against wars is as futile as "passing laws against headache and sore throat."

When a person has a headache or a sore throat if he be wise he seeks the CAUSE and eliminates that. He will immediately realize that this trouble is caused by the violation of a law. He will make, remake or amend his own self-made laws and rules of living. When he learns that something he does will give him a headache he will, given just a wee pinch of common sense, avoid it. He will make a law that that particular action, or thought, is to be avoided. That is law and the making of the law is legislation.

We live, or should live by self made laws. If sufficient numbers of people make and keep good self-made laws there will be less and less need for collective lawmaking and outside restrictions. The Kasidah has it:

Do what thy manhood bids thee do,  
From none but self expect applause.  
He noblest lives and noblest dies,  
Who makes and keeps his self-made laws.

Wars will be outlawed and abolished when enough people make and keep self-made laws to the extent that their habits are formed, character is built and their destiny is worked out on a high plane. Nations thereby will have their character formed and destiny made. There will be no more war.

## Vocational Stuff

The last week or two there have been several thousand boys and girls who justly think of themselves as men and women—turned out—"graduated"—from High Schools and other educational institutions, most of whom will immediately be looking round for a "job." In all probability not one percent of the number have given any serious thought to what they really want to be or do, to what their place in the world really should be. And in consequence, when the clerk on Bill Jones' grocery goes off on his holidays, and possibly finds a better place somewhere else, John Brown, who has made honors in English and composition and who is, probably, fitted to write or to teach, tumbles into the clerk's place and learns the grocery

business. The chances are good that he will stay in that business since he knows more about it than anything else, particularly if he is not blessed with an unusual modicum of ambition. Or because Miss Wilson, the local milliner, needs a girl to help get ready for the fall opening, Bessie Brewster goes in with her, in spite of the facility she has shown in handling children and the ability to direct games in the High School series, and is shortly found in a city wholesale house learning the fine points of keeping up with the new Paris styles in hats. Isn't that about the way it happens, nine times out of ten? In some of the High Schools of the U. S. they are trying to remedy this situation by applying a little so-called "psychology"—in reality intelligently-applied common sense, and have the principal or someone who has studied the matter a little, study the boys and girls a year or so before the graduation time, and advise them as to their vocation. The same thing can be done in even a better way by fathers and mothers, who care enough for their children to study their aptitudes and look into the possibilities of various trades and professions. The main thing—and this is not written without experience—is to get the boy or girl thinking themselves dreaming dreams, if you will, of what the future holds for them. If they can be persuaded to do that they will work out for themselves what they want to do. Of course another feature which enters into the situation is the "get-rich-quick" idea, which pervades the minds of too many fathers and mothers, as well as of the boys and girls themselves. It is surprising, however, how frequently the boy or girl of the present generation has faced the latter situation, particularly when they have been through church and other institution which promote the idea of service as a basis of life-welfare. And with a grounding of that kind there isn't much likelihood that they will choose for mon-

ey-making alone where they do decide what the life "job" is going to be.—Action Free Press.
