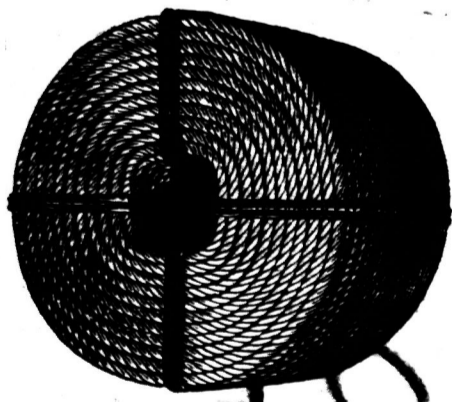

my on which the Government went into office are being fulfilled. The first definite token that there was an earnest effort to that end came in the Budget, which announced not only a reduction in the National Debt of some \$30,000,000, but in addition a saving in the taxation burden of at least \$26,000,000. Later, at the conclusion of the fiscal year, it was found that the actual debt reduction was some \$5,000,000 greater than had been stated in the Budget, by reason of unforeseen economies in National disbursements. Now come the supplementary estimates, with the smallest total known in many years, some \$5,000,000.

Since the advent of the Budget and the tabling of the main estimates, the official Opposition has been making a great deal about the supplementary estimates. The House has been told, day in and day out, that the latter would be on a very extensive scale and that the mottled savings that had been claimed would disappear as a mist before the sun. The Opposition has been badly fooled. Not in many years has there been such concrete evidence of an honest effort to get rid of the "pork barrel" feature that in past years, and under all Governments, was conspicuous in the supplementary estimates. There is not the slightest evidence of the financial bribery that the House had been told was on the way.

More than that. This latest list of proposed expenditures for the year now entered upon contains many items that will appeal to all classes in the country as evidences of clean-cut statesmanship. For instance, the provision of \$200,000 to bonus the railway companies for demonstration hauls to Eastern Canada of Alberta coal; \$30,000 to cover the operations of a Board to advise the Minister regarding Tariff policies; \$20,000 to cover the cost of the new Board of Taxation—these are expenditures that are likely to bring to the country savings that will run into hundreds of thousands, with resultant relief to the ordinary taxpayer.
