A live stock judging competition for farmers' sons will be held in connection with the Western Fair, London, which takes place Sept 6th to 18th. The entries for this competition are to be made with W. D. Jackson, Dominion Savings Bldg., Richmond St., London, and close on August 30th. Entry fee 50c.

### LIVE STOCK JUDGING COMPETITION REGULATIONS

1. The Live Stock Judging Competition will be held under the supervision of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Open to the farmers or farmers' sons under 26 years of age. Graduates of an Agricultural College will not be eligible.

2. The Judges for the Competition will be supplied by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

3. Entries must be made and forwarded to the Manager, Western Fair Association, London, not later than Wednesday, September 3rd.

4. Contestants will not be permitted to enter in more than two classes of live stock.

5. Any person who has won a first prize in any section of the judging competition will not hereafter be eligible to compete in that section.

6. Contestants will be allowed 20 minutes for placing each class and writing reasons. Reasons will also be given orally.

7. Prizes will be awarded on basis of 100 points; placing, 50 points; reasons, 50 points.

### THE ESKIMO'S CURIOSITY

"The Eskimo has no curiosity about anything strange to him except animals," says Robert J. Flaherty, F.R.G.S., producer and photographer of the marvelous Pathe feature, "Nanook of the North," showing on August 1st and 2nd at the Regah Theatre, Hagersville.

On one of his expeditions into the Ungava Peninsula, in the Hudson Bay regions, for Sir William Mackenzie, Mr. Flaherty took a monkey. This queer animal brought forth many questions, and they never tired of studying his habits.

But of the white man—his different language, his white skin and fair coloring; his different clothes, and where he came from, the Eskimo has no curiosity. The Eskimo's life is centered around animals, for it is on them that he subsists, and, in the frozen north food is wealth, life, pleasure, everything!
