Appreciation for the Teachers

Something should be said in a very public way about the time the schools close, of appreciation for the service that the teachers of Jarvis have given to the community.

It is a service that can never be paid for in dollars and cents. The work of teaching is not considered financially rewarding. Most of the people who enter this profession have abilities that would command higher pay in other fields of effort. These people enter this profession primarily because they have a love for it.

The gardener who plants his vegetables and flowers in his back yard would often admit that as far as money goes he is not compensated for the time he has put into that work. But he gets a satisfaction from seeing things grow. In the same way the teacher finds a deep satisfaction in watching the mental growth of young people, and in shaping that development along helpful lines.

It is impossible to over-estimate the service that these people have rendered to the community. Without their patient and devoted effort the institutions of the country and our home towns would slump into decadence. The teachers, pass on knowledge and ideals from one generation to another, and build the foundation

for useful and beneficent lives. The teachers in our schools should receive such hearty recognition for this service, that they will feel that whatever sacrifice they have made on the money side has been compensated by the affection of their townspeople and of the young people whom they have helped toward success in life. The work of a good teacher is arduous. It involves nervous strain, constant mental effort, and incessant giving of one's self to others. Let us try to give something of warm appreciation and regard in return.
