in spite of much heavier traffic on all lines (necessitating larger trains, more of them and a heavier personnel list), the operating expenses are increased by less than \$5,000,000. An interesting feature of the report was a paragraph stating that, this year, the sum of \$22,500 was being set aside to cover interest payments, for 1922, on Grand Trunk Pacific perpetual debentures—the first real gleam of sunshine to come to thousands of British investors in that enterprise of other days.

Of some widespread interest was Mr. Graham's hint that, very shortly, there might be several additions to the Board of Directors of the National Railway. The idea, he explained, was to secure a larger quorum within easy call of the head office; say within 10 hours' travel of Montreal. The geographical plan, while excellent in one way, had not proved extremely satisfactory in exigencies, when important matters had to be dealt with, very often, at short notice. For that reason, he intimated, the Board probably would be strengthened in the very near future by men chosen from the central region.

### The Alternative Vote

Not much time has been lost by the government in implementing that passage in the speech from the Throne which promised a trial of the "alternative vote" principle. Hon. Ernest Lapointe early last week gave notice that a bill was on the way which would provide for the necessary amendments of the Federal Elections Act to permit an experiment with the transferable vote in single-member ridings where there were entered in contest more than two candidates.

### Senate Backing the C.N.R.

Reference was recently made to the fact that the Commons had passed the 26 bills relating to Canadian National Railway branch lines and had forwarded them, for concurrence, to the Senate. If the writer remembers right, prediction was made, also, that the bills would have a rough passage in the Upper Chamber. That prediction was well founded. The venerable gentlemen of the Senate received the first bill, in committee, with open arms—open to get it in their clutches, that is—instead of approving it, or rejecting it, the committee decided to hear more about all the Branch Line Bills from Canadian National engineers and executives? Bless you, no;

from the technical advisers of Mr. E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway! Fired with a suspicion of their deliberations until this week, in order to permit a sort of round-table conference on the Thornton Branch-line program, with the representatives of the C.P.R. present to state their views in the matter. Of course the C.N.R. will be represented, too; maybe the public at large, as well, but the C.P.R. beyond question.

Were it not ludicrous, the idea would be ridiculous in its absurdity. But, it is ludicrous after all? Is it a mere good joke, with no after-effect? Is it not, rather, an extraordinary prostration of authority, this talking in of Sir Henry Thornton's opponents in railroad to put their seal upon his plans for the huge system he is paid to manage for the Canadian people? The will tell. At the moment, the outlook is somewhat ominous in respect of "fair play" for the National Railways.

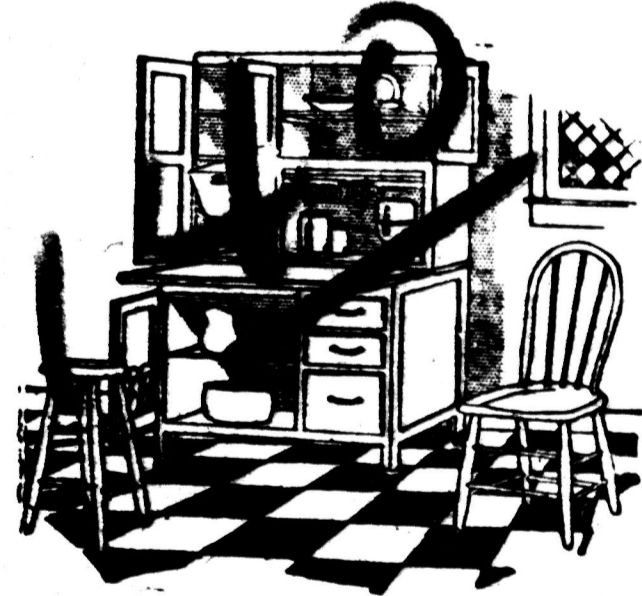
