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## Protect the Birds

Canada's estimated loss to field, orchard and garden crops by destructive insects is estimated by the Dominion entomologist at \$200,000,000. And that amount does not include the loss by forest insects, stored produce insects or other varieties.

Two hundred million dollars is an amazing amount and it is all taken out of the pocket of the farmer and the gardener. Poisons are used in large quantities and they are expensive. The cost is not only for the material but for the time in applying it.

There is only one effective way to combat the insects. Birds are their natural enemy. It is said that if all the birds were exterminated the country would be barren in only a few years. The logical plan to stop the ravages of insects then is to increase the number of birds. The birds only need protection. Curb the boy with the gun and the desire for robbing birds' nests and a lot will be done to rid the country of insects. And the cost is nothing.

## Tariff Changes

"National unity, not less than national prosperity, depends upon the surmounting of those barriers which have tended to separate western from eastern Canada and to discourage permanent settlement upon the land. Foremost in this regard are the problems incidental to tariff readjustments and to the marketing of agricultural and other natural products."

That is the portion of the speech from the throne at the opening of the Dominion parliament at Ottawa, which is supposed to tell what the government intends to do about tariff. Although the statement itself is rather vague, as speeches from the throne usually are, it is taken for granted in all quarters, and not denied by officials of the government that it means a lower duty on farm implements; or in other words, that the government intends to obtain the support of the Progressives of the west by the sacrifice of not only the manufacturer but of the farmer himself.

Far more important to the farmer, especially the farmer of the east, than cheap production, is his home market. Production that would cost nothing would not benefit the farmer if his market be gone — and for many months his market has been moving across the line to the United States at the rate of thousands per month and it is moving because manufacturing in Canada is at a low ebb. Farm implements are piled up to the roofs of Toronto warehouses, Brantford plants which manufacture farm implements are practically closed and not so long ago night shifts had to be employed to keep up with the orders. From plants of all kinds manufactured articles are being produced just as orders are received when only a short time ago manufacturers were confident of their market and produced large quantities for

future sales. That confidence is gone because the market is moving away. The manufacturer is the man who sells labor by wholesale. If he has no market for that labor, labor will seek another wholesaler but when he moves he takes with him a part of the natural market of the farmer. The farmer has to seek other markets but more distant and he has to pay the cost of transportation, excessive packing and duties to reach those markets. That excess of cost is waste so far as Canada is concerned. It makes the people of Canada that much poorer and the only assistance given goes to the coffers of some other country that may collect the duty.

The United States is regarded, and not without cause, as the most prosperous country in the world today. She has put up a tariff wall such as is seldom heard of and she has restricted immigration. Canada has lowered her tariff and evidently plans to lower it still farther, and is seeking immigration.

The answer should be easy.
