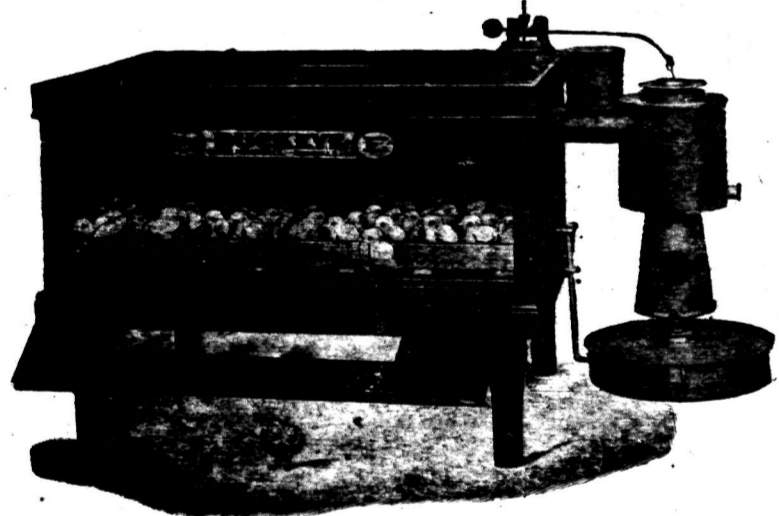

CHILDREN'S AID

the future success of the society is assured.

Particularly appreciative are we for the great assistance given us by the press.

Also our appreciation is sincere of the good practical work done on behalf of the neglected child by various organizations such as the Women's Institutes, church societies and Sabbath schools of the county, the Women's Liberal club, I. O. D. E., Masonic lodges, Loyal Orange lodges and the Ladies' Loyal Orange association of Dunnville.

We wish to thank Harrison Arrell, crown attorney, and Col. J. C. Massie, magistrate, for their hearty interest and co-operation in the work and to W. T. Robb for free legal advice.

Under the Children of Un-married Parents Act, five cases have been dealt with or are under consideration, settlement has been made in cases by parents of money, others dismissed owing to lack of sufficient corroborative evidence.

During the year legal adoption has been given in four cases with others awaiting completion. This requires careful judgment as it entirely relieves the child from the supervision of the society.

Owing to the lack of a shelter, we have been obliged to place our wards in private homes, and while this might appear to be partially satisfactory, it has not been at all convenient.

We have been fortunate in securing splendid homes for temporary residence, yet on the other hand circumstances forced us to place children in homes, owing to immediate action necessary, that were not satisfactory.

At the present time we have 18 children placed in temporary homes in the county and outside. These children are awaiting placement in foster homes.

The distance to and from these homes necessitates extra traveling expense, which would be eliminated had we a shelter.

We cannot close our report without making special reference to the hearty co-operation of the president and the members of the executive, for their loyal support and deep interest and concern in our endeavor to accomplish the work that is entrusted to us.

Applications for children, 24; children involved during the year, 60; children made wards, 8; investigations, 24; mail received, 375; mail sent out, 1,280; meetings addressed, 18; parents prosecuted, 6; court attended, 18; wards returned from foster homes, 5; wards in temporary homes, 18; office interviews, 350; wards released (21 years of age), 4.

They will sing these verses with a new zeal, and perhaps with a tear and a prayer if they knew the story of the life struggle which produced the poetry.

Take for instance, the Olney hymn: "God moves in a mysterious way." Those who know, never listen to those verses without a mental vision of a river and a man seeking peace in its dark water.

Cowper, during one of the awful seasons of mental depression to which he was subject, resolved to take his own life. He told his coachman to drive to the river Ouse. The night was dark and the driver missed his way, either by accident or of set purpose; and, after a long drive the poet found himself back again at his own house. The mental cloud had lifted; the horrible desire for sudden death had left him by the time he reached home, and, with the light of God's countenance in his soul, he wrote:

"Ye fearful saints fresh courage take;
The clouds ye so much dread
Are big with mercy, and shall break
In blessings on your head."

It is the same spirit which breathes in another of his verses:

"I deliver'd thee when bound,
And, when bleeding, heal'd thy wound."

Indeed, one seems to hear the rumbling of the carriage wheels as the driver makes for the dark river, but fails to find it, because the controlling hand of the Creator and Preserver of men is guiding him to a higher destiny.

"Sought thee, wandering, set thee right,
Turn'd thy darkness into light."

In his own verses Cowper draws his own portrait, opens his own heart, imprints his own thoughts, and sketches his own life.

See him now. He has arrived at home safely. The nightmare of depression has left him. He lifts up his wounded heart to the Comforter—

"Return, O Holy Dove, return,
Sweet messenger of rest."

This single page out of the poet's life explains why the Olney hymns are unspakably precious to souls passing through the shadow, and subject to seasons of depression. Cowper seems to come out of his grave, and like his risen Saviour, "he communes with them by the way."

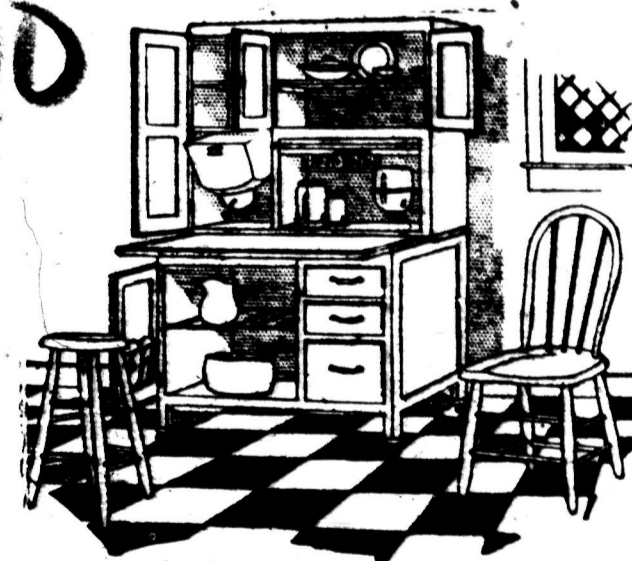
