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An Urgent Need

The necessity for vaccination is clearly demonstrated in the official report of the epidemic in Windsor.

The report has just been compiled by the medical officer of health of that city. He says, that of the 39 cases reported the 32 persons who died had not been vaccinated. The death rate among persons who were not vaccinated was 82 per cent.

Many people scattered throughout the country object to vaccination and those objections are nearly always based on rumors of suffering ill effects from vaccination. But physicians agree that when trouble of a serious nature follows vaccination it is because the sore cause has not been taken care of. It has been allowed to become affected and the trouble is caused by carelessness rather than by vaccination.

Vaccination is imperative and not only when there is a smallpox scare, for then it may be too late.

A Problem

The Home bank probe by the Dominion authorities has been started, but already it is resolving itself into a probe of men who have held the portfolio of minister of finance at Ottawa as of the affairs of the bank.

Depositors who lost, in many cases, their life savings, are encouraged in their appeal that the government make good their losses by evidence of laxity on the part of those ministers of finance. They contend that if their loss was occasioned by the fault of public officials they should be reimbursed out of public funds and there seems to be some force to their contention. But if their appeal is granted on those grounds it will be only another instance of the general public suffering, because of the incompetence or laxity of public officials in whom the people has sufficient confidence to grant the highest honor possible.

That appeal, however, may not have the strongest pulling power for reimbursement. There are thousands of people in Canada who lost money in the Home bank crash even not including the stockholders. That means thousands of votes. It is not difficult to visualize the effect any action the government may take regarding reimbursing depositors will have when the votes are cast at the next general election, which is bound to come before such action is forgotten. Will the government be strong enough to disregard that aspect of the situation or will its action be controlled or tempered by an opportunity to make friends of the depositors by giving

that which they demand? Following such criticism and the resulting loss of popularity the situation offers a tempting opportunity to obtain friends and that means votes. Whatever action the government takes it will have a direct effect on the pockets of thousands of people and people are prone to be more interested in that affect than in general legislation or indirect taxation.
