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## HALDIMAND COUNTY COUNCIL MEETS; SIXTH SESSION

### First Day—Report of Committees—The Auditor's Quarterly Report

Cayuga, Thursday, May 8, 1924.

Council met pursuant to adjournment.

All the members present, except George L. Miller, Reeve of Jarvis, and Thomas Camsford, Deputy Reeve of Dunnville.

Clark-Smeller—That Reeve Buckner act as Warden in the absence of the Warden. Carried.

Colter—Last—That this Council do resume business with Reeve Buckner in the chair. Carried.

The minutes of the last meeting were then read.

Saunders-Kern—That the minutes of last meeting be adopted as read. Carried.

The following communications were then read:

1. Assessor of Cayuga notifying that assessment on the Judge's residence is \$4500 and Court House flats \$1500.

2. Minister of Mines acknowledging receipt of resolution of County Council with reference to the proposed amendment to the Natural Gas Conservation Act.

3. Department of Public Highways acknowledging receipt of two copies of by-law apportioning \$40,000 for maintenance of county roads.

4. John Senn, Secretary of Municipal Association to arrange opening of Court House without waiting for representatives from Municipal Associations.

5. Charles R. Bilger, Inspector of Children's Aid Society, that he will be glad to send maintenance statements.

6. County Clerk giving list of those holding auctioneer and pedlar's licenses.

7. J. C. Massie, Police Magistrate, enclosing copy of order that Cora, Minnie, Christina, Jennie and George Hunter be delivered into the custody of the Children's Aid Society of Haldimand.

8. J. C. Massie, Police Magistrate, enclosing copy of order that Gordon Ernest Desser be delivered into the custody of the Children's Aid Society of Haldimand.

9. Employers' Liability Assurance Corporation re County Court House.

10. Inspector of Hospitals, that per diem made to House of Refuge will be discontinued from the 1st of April.

Buckner-Brown—That the Messrs. French, Kern and Saunders be a special committee to deal with the communications. Carried.

Clark-Colter—That a by-law be introduced and read a first time authorizing the loan of \$40,000.00 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce for Good Roads purposes repayable December 30, 1924, at 6%.

Colter—Last—That a by-law to borrow \$40,000.00 from the Bank of Commerce for Good Roads purposes be read a second time. Carried.

Kern-Saunders—That the by-law to borrow \$40,000.00 from the Bank of Commerce for Good Roads purposes be read a third time, passed, signed by the Warden and the Clerk and the Corporate seal attached as in the original motion. Carried.

Scott-Smeller—That permission be given to William Hewitt and Walter Hewitt to maintain a gas line on what is known as the third line of Seneca being County Road No. 18, on condition that they enter into a bond with the County to indemnify the County against all loss, costs, charges, damages and expenses resulting through the laying or maintenance of said lines and agreeing to remove said line at any time if it interferes with the construction or maintenance of the road. Carried.

Smeller-Clark—That this Council do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet. Carried.

Brown-McDonald—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. Carried.

McDonald-Patton—That the report of the Home Committee be received and read. Carried.

Gentlemen: We, your Building Committee have met and beg leave to report as follows:

1. We have a report from W. A. H. Tomlinson with reference to laying out the Court House grounds and as he suggests that the work be done by day labor under the supervision of Fred Barraclough and the chairman of this committee we would so recommend.

2. The work is not entirely completed but we would recommend the payment to Stuart Bros., Ltd., of the sum of ten thousand dollars on account of the balance of \$26,000 due them and that a personal bond of Stuart Bros., Ltd., for the due completion of the building and the payment of all accounts be taken.

3. We recommend the payment to Frank Barber & Associates, Ltd., of the sum of \$1,000 on account.

4. We have sold the old radiators to Hersch for \$12.00 and payment has been made to the chairman of the Finance Committee.

5. We recommend that the Golden All Weather Metal Strip Company be instructed to put in weather stripping as per contract for the sum of \$308 and that the sum of \$468 be deducted from Stuart Bros., Ltd., contract price instead of putting on storm windows.
