Favorite Hymns

"My God, I Thank Thee, Who Hast Made"

My God, I thank Thee, Who hast made the earth so bright; So full of splendor and of joy, Beauty and light; So many glorious things are here, Noble and right. I thank Thee too that Thou hast made Joy to abound; Yet all with wings; So many gentle thoughts and needs Circling us round, That in the darkest spot on earth Some love is found. I thank Thee more than all our joy Is touched with pain; That shadows fall on brightest hours; That thorns remain; So that earth's bliss may be our guide And not our chain. For Thou, Who knowest, Lord, how Our weak heart clings, Hast given us joys, tender and true, Hast given us wings; So that we see, gleaming on high, Diviner things. I thank Thee, Lord, that Thou hast The best in store; We have enough, yet not too much To long for more; A yearning for a deeper peace, Not known before. I thank Thee, Lord, that here our Though amply blest, Can never find, although they seek, A perfect rest— Nor ever shall, until they lean On Jesus' breast.

The author of this hymn, Adelaide Ann Proctor, was born in 1825 and died in 1864. Her father, Bryan Proctor, under his pen-name of "Barry Cornwall," contributed two hundred intensely moral poems in the Literary Gazette, besides a great deal of other valuable work. He was a schoolfellow of Byron at Harrow. Her mother, a woman of much sprightliness and vigor, was born in 1799, was a friend of Keats and Shelley, and lived till 1888. Adelaide Ann Proctor's love of poetry was such that even before she could write she made her mother copy her favorite pieces into a tiny album, concerning which Charles Dickens said: "It looked as if she had carried it about as another little girl might have carried a doll."

She wrote several hymns which found wide acceptance and with regard to this one, of which we give a copy, Bishop Bickersteth, a near relative of the poet clergyman of that name, said: "This most beautiful hymn touches the cord of thankfulness in trial as perhaps, no other hymn does, and is thus most useful for the visitation of the sick." Other of her hymns are "The Shadows of the Evening Hours" and the vesper hymn "Lord Keep Us Safe To-night."

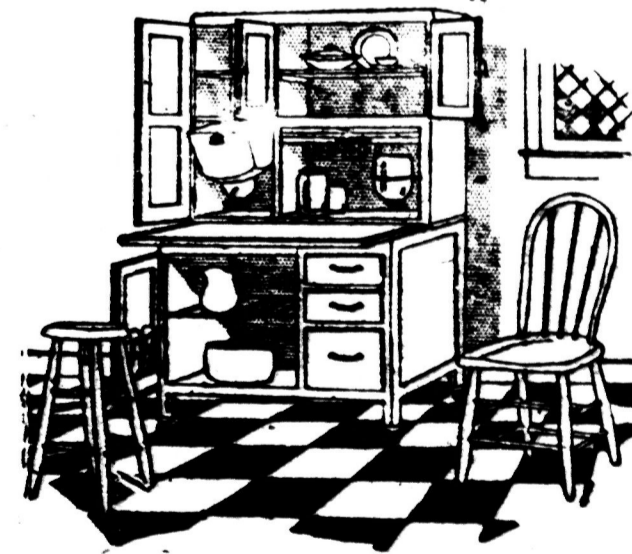
