A Deserved Rebuke

Tokutomi Kenjiro, a Christian gentleman of Japan, famed as one of the greatest literary men of modern times is earnestly advising the American missionaries, his close friends, to return to their homes.

In his gentle but firm urgency this great friend of humanity is joined by other native Christians who request the missionaries to return to the land where they are apparently so sorely needed. In simple words they say that these missionaries are "as gardeners set to work in their neighbors' yard" they will return to find "their own gardens covered with weeds."

While Kenjiro may have been a little bit hard when speaking of the militarism of the United States there is a note of sorrow when he speaks of his missionary friends.

"Dear friends, return to your own country and re-plant the tree of Christ among the heathen. Teach the humble in spirit."

"Teach your people before God to treat their inferiors because of the superiority of their mode of living."

"You have lived in Japan too long. You are out of touch with your people as they are out of communion with Christ."

This is not a too subtle hint that American people are drifting far from the teachings of Jesus and the principles of the Christian religion; that the Universal Brotherhood of Man and the rules of Christianity are not recognized by the American government nor the American people.

This is the frank and direct talk of an honest man, firm in his conviction that he is living a Christian life.
