THE JARVIS FALL FAIR AND SCHOOL FAIR PRIZE WINNERS

BABY SHOW GREAT ATTRACTION—S. N. NO. 21 WINNER OF SHIELD

One of the most interesting features of the Jarvis Fall Fair was the Baby Show, prizes being donated by Dr. Leatherdale, and as last year, there was a great deal of interest and enthusiasm in this event. The points on which the judges marked their points were as follows: (1) Build; (2) Nurishment; (3) Development; (4) Complexion; (5) Hair; (6) Teeth; (7) Nose; (8) Chin; (9) Cheeks; (10) Neck; (11) Ears; (12) Ears; (13) Expression; (14) General Impression. There were 150 marks given, 10 marks for each feature and 30 marks given for general impression.

The judges had a great deal of controversy in deciding who was the prize winner. However, they finally decided to give Marie Mulkins and Dulete Williamson 1st prize, Edwin Burnett 2nd and Wilma Johnston 3rd. Drs. Bowman, Unsworth and Newell, of Hamilton, were the judges, and are to be complimented on the very able and efficient manner in which they conducted the show.
