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**Canada' Mineral Resources**

During the first six months of 1924, Ontario, produced \$11,810,000 worth of gold. This represents an increase of 25 per cent over corresponding period for 1923.

This rapid increase in production of gold is but one of the many important mineral developments that are going on in Canada. The search for oil at Alberta has attracted considerable attention and some of the best informed oil men in the United States have predicted that a good field would be opened there.

Report is to the effect that a group of New York men are considering forming a large concern to develop the tar sands of Canada.

Canada has one of the largest deposits of shale oil to be found in America. It looks like Canada is all set for a large program of mineral and industrial expansion. Her resources are abundant, and the vastness of her mineral deposits open a field for the oil and oil man.

**The Real Force**

"I am not a pacifist, not an absolutist, I believe in an adequate police force, municipal, national and international," said Dr. G. Sherwood Eddy, "but the police force I believe in is not one that will police the offenders against human welfare in institutions and under conditions which are the breeding grounds of further offences of more trouble than the past. I believe in a force that is defensive, that attempts to reclaim the offender and raise him to the level of human association, and the force that renews itself upon him. I am not concerned whether a man is an absolutist in theory or one who is of the belief that there may be circumstances under which he would go to war. I am concerned that practically both types are sincere and earnest in the working towards the abolition of war, towards the removal of the causes which make war inevitable," said Dr. Eddy, when asked what his attitude was toward war.

Dr. Eddy is one of the principal speakers at the 59th Provincial Convention of the Ontario Religious Education Council, at Kitchener, Oct. 27-29.

Dr. Donald MacGillivray, who is one of the chief speakers at the Ottawa Convention, Oct. 29-31, has returned recently from Shanghai, China, where he was in close touch with the political conditions, and can speak with authority on the present outlook. He is a graduate of the University of Toronto, where he received the honorary degree of LL.D. Dr. MacGillivray is a very interesting and forceful speaker.

**AT THE POLICE COURT**

George Duxbury, a farmer living near Chesley, was before Magistrate Massie in the Village of Selkirk last week on a charge of having liquor in an unlawful place. The accused is owner of two farms. He formerly resided on a farm on which is a frame house. He afterward purchased a farm close by, on which is a brick house, having a cook stove and some furniture in the frame building and continuing to work the farm. While working on that farm he had his meals in the frame house, and slept there when there was anything wrong with his stock, nearly all of which he kept on that farm.

The license inspector went to the frame house during the summer and found that there was no one there, and that there was liquor in it. The Magistrate dismissed the charge, on the ground that the house was not used for any other purpose than as a private dwelling. Harrison Arrell, K.C., appeared for the Crown and S. E. Lindsay for the defendant.

**IS YOUR BEST OFFICIAL OF CANADIAN PACIFIC**

Leo Solloway, recently appointed Assistant Freight Agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway with office at Montreal and supervision over Oriental and Australasian traffic via Pacific Ports.

Born in Vancouver in 1895, Mr. Solloway has the distinction now of being the youngest official in Canadian Pacific service; a distinction which he has won through fourteen years' service in the freight department of the Company. He commenced work as stenographer in the steamship department of the General Freight office in Vancouver in 1910, and remained in that department until 1915 when he enlisted for active service with the 72nd Highlanders. He returned from overseas in the Fall of 1917 and was attached to the steamship export department in Vancouver until 1918 when he was loaned to the British Ministry of Shipping, acting as assistant to the agent of the Ministry at the Pacific port.

In June 1919, Mr. Solloway went to Montreal as chief clerk to the Asiatic Freight Agent. Two years later he was appointed chief clerk to the General Foreign Freight Agent, and last May appointed as Acting Asiatic Freight Agent which office has been confirmed by promulgation.

**THE COUNTY COUNCIL**

MINUTES OF THE SESSION HELD AT CAYUGA ON THURSDAY OCTOBER 2

Council met pursuant to adjournment. The Warden in the chair. All the members present except George L. Miller, Reeve of Jarvis.

McDonald-Patton — That Messrs. Saunders, Kern and Scott be a special committee on communications. Lost.

Saunders-Kern — In amendment, that Messrs. Patton, Glenn and McDonald be a committee on communications. Carried.

The following communications were dealt with as follows:

1. Letter from Minister of Public Works, acknowledging receipt of resolution. Filed with Clerk.
2. Letter from County Treasurer, Ernest Hinchliffe. Referred to Good Roads Committee.
3. Letter from County of Lincoln, enclosing resolution recommending that the supplementary grants on teachers' salary be continued. Referred to Committee of the Whole.
4. Letter from J. C. Eccles, enclosing Grand Jury report. Filed with Clerk.
5. Letter from Clerk of the Township of Seneca, asking that bridge between Seneca and North Cayuga be taken over as a county bridge. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

6. Letter from N. Foreman, re accident and broken car. Referred to Good Roads Committee.

7. Letter from County Clerk of Norfolk, re expenditures on bridges on Town Line. Referred to Road and Bridge Committee.

8. Letter from Deputy Minister of Highways, re meeting of Wardens. Filed with Clerk.

9. Letter from Fred Barraclough, re appointment of gaoler. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

A by-law was passed fixing the salary of the manager of the House of Refuge at \$900 and the matron of the House of Refuge at \$300 per year, payable monthly, to date from Aug. 1st, 1924.

The County will defray the expenses of the three successful judges of the stock to the Winter Fair at Toronto and three to the Winter Fair at Guelph.

The Clerk was instructed to ask Dr. Berry to arrange a conference with the Premier and Minister of Mines with reference to the gas legislation of 1924, and the Council, with the Clerk and Mr. Lindsay were appointed to attend as deputation at the conference.

The Clerk, Mr. Colter and Mr. Clark were a committee to draw a telegram to be forwarded to the Hon. the Minister of Mines, re the gas question.

A by-law was passed making a grant of \$4012.89 to the Village of Cayuga under the provisions of the Highway Improvement Act.

The report of the Home Committee was adopted as follows:

To the Warden and Council: At the present time there are 39 inmates, 14 females, 25 males.

There has been one death, that of Mrs. Rosie Sharp of Dunville, and two have been discharged, M. A. Bunkon and Mrs. Escripp, both of Dunville.

We have examined the accounts for maintenance and supplies for August and September, find them correct, and would recommend the same to the Finance Committee for payment.

A by-law was passed making a grant to the Haldimand War Memorial Hospital of \$1200.

The report of the Building Committee was adopted as follows:

To the Warden and County Council: We recommend that the domestic pump on which H. McFarlane has given a tender of \$164.00, be accepted, providing he will pay for installation.

We further recommend as follows:

1. That the Clerk be instructed to notify the Erie Telephone Co. to install the telephone at once.
2. That two electric lights and standard be placed, one south of the routhouse and one at the Registry Office.
3. That the gas engine be not disposed of at the present time.
