(Continued from Page 1) the different cities and counties so spoken and declared by vote in their conventions.

Be it resolved that the S.S.A. of County of Haldimand now assembled in our Annual Convention declare our firm conviction after experience and a thorough study of the two questions, that the O.T.A. ought to be continued, because we believe that the O.T.A. is the best temperance legislation we have ever had, and that so called Government Control is a retrograde step which we cannot by any means tolerate. And that copies of this be sent to our county local press and also to our city dailies.

The session closed with a Round Table conference, led by Dr. Dayfoot, and heartily appreciated by all present.

After a very excellent supper, when the delegates were entertained by the combined Ladies Aids of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches, the evening sederunt opened with a song service, after which Rev. H. Brand conducted the devotional exercises. The committees appointed to nominate officers for the ensuing year then made their report, after which Rev. A. B. Higginson gave a splendid address on "Christ, the Teacher." He pointed out that Jesus had certain characteristics. There were those we could not copy. His originality, His authority, and the miraculousness of His teaching. There were those we dare not copy, His positiveness, His assurance, His self-representation; but there were also those we could and should copy. His naturalness, His simplicity, His variety, suggestiveness, definiteness, catholicity, and tenderness. His words awakened the consciences and stirred the hearts of men, and any teaching that does not do that is of little or no value.

Dr. Dayfoot again addressed the convention speaking on "Service." Service has come to be the keynote of all we do. "Rodger Babson makes it the keynote of all his teaching and advice to the public. We give the best service when we pattern our lives on that of Jesus Christ. We can serve wherever we are; there must be no limit to it. Amongst its rewards are a gracious memory, a well earned rest, and an opportunity for future service.

During the evening, Mrs. Shirley Rodgers Bates sang two excellent solos, her rendering of "The Ninety and Nine" being magnificent.
