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INJURED IN MOTOR CRASH, CHEAPSIDE WOMAN DIES

WAS TROWN THROUGH WINDOW OF CAR—WERE ON THE WAY TO PORT DOVER

CAYUGA, Sept. 7.—Mrs. Thomas Cunningham, of Cheapside, injured in a motor accident a week ago yesterday, when she and her husband, driving to Lockport, were struck by another car, died last night at Selkirk. An autopsy was performed by Dr. Deadman, of Hamilton City Hospital, and an inquest opened by Dr. G. V. Simpson, of Cayuga, county coroner, has been adjourned until next Thursday at 1 p.m.

The accident occurred at the corner at McGay's schoolhouse, one mile south of Cheapside, early on Saturday afternoon, Aug. 30th, when a motor car driven by Mr. Maw, president of the Wire Company of Hamilton, crashed into one driven by Robert Cunningham, of Lockport, N.Y., who was on his way to Port Dover. Mrs. Thomas Cunningham was thrown through the back window of their machine and suffered a fractured skull, all fingers on both hands broken and other injuries, and her condition was thought to be critical.

Mr. Cunningham, his father, Thomas, Cunningham, and his sister, Mrs. Roy Hare, were thrown from the car and were severely shaken up, but not seriously injured. The Hamilton car turned turtle, but Mr. and Mrs. Maw escaped with a bad shaking up.

Dr. McGilvery, of Simcoe, and Dr. McCracken, of Hagersville, were called. As Mrs. Cunningham's condition was too serious to permit her removal to a hospital, she was taken to William Bassingdale's farmhouse.

ONTARIO TO LEVY TAX ON GASOLINE

After some years of discussion on the subject, observation of its effects in the United States and tabulation of statistics and reports thereon, Ontario is at last going to have a gasoline tax, according to information made available. This new form of taxation, it was said, is going to be submitted for legislative approval at the coming session.

The tax will amount, it is understood to two cents on every gallon, and, instead of being imposed at the retail end of the distribution system, it will be imposed upon the wholesalers. It has been estimated by the department, that a two-cent tax would bring in from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000 additional provincial revenues each year.

Besides this move to secure additional monies for highways construction and maintenance, it was also stated authoritatively in the same connection that the government will considerably increase the license fees on motor trucks using the highways.

The youngest son of the Jordans, back from war-life in France, hungers for the warmth and pretty girls which he found in the southern European land, and fights against home existence.

Richard Dix plays the returned soldier. Lois Wilson has the role of the heiress of Mrs. Jordan, who discovers that the dead mother's wishes include the bringing back of the boy to the Jordan traditions.

BAG LIMITS; SHOOTING RESTRICTIONS

PROVIDED BY THE MIGRATORY BIRDS CONVENTION ACT AND REGULATIONS

Next to the observations of the shooting season themselves the most important factor for giving all hunters an equal chance to take game, and for giving all game a fair chance, is the observation of the bag limit and of certain simple shooting restrictions. Following the Migratory Bird Treaty such restrictions have been provided throughout Canada and the United States, and thus the hunters of both countries are given equal privileges while the game stock is conserved as well.

BAG LIMITS

Daily bag limits in Ontario: Duck 25, Geese 15, Brant 15, Rails 25, Black-bellied and Golden Plovers and Lesser Yellow-legs 15 of all kinds, Wilson or Jack-snipe 25, Woodcock 10. Not more than 200 ducks shall be taken in any one season.

SHOOTING RESTRICTIONS

The use of automatic, swivel or machine guns, or battery, or any gun larger than a number 10 gauge is prohibited, and the use of any aeroplane, power boat, sail boat or night light, and shooting from any horse drawn or motor vehicle is forbidden.

The shooting of migratory game birds, in the Province of Ontario, earlier than sunrise or later than sunset is prohibited.

H. GILBERTSON TO FACE TRIAL

AT HALDIMAND ASSIZES — IS CHARGED WITH MURDERING HER HUSBAND

The Haldimand Assizes will open at Cayuga on Tuesday of next week, September 16th, at 1 p.m., before the Honorable Mr. Justice Kelly.

There is only one criminal case to come before the Court, but that is one of a most serious character. Mrs. Helen Gilbertson will be tried on the charge of murdering her husband at Hagersville on the 22nd day of June last. The Attorney-General has requested Harrison Arrell, K.C., to conduct the prosecution. R. S. Colter will defend the accused.

There will be several civil cases entered for trial.

POLICE COURT

At Dunnville on Thursday last, Walter Latham, Wesley Nye, Charles Latham and Thomas Humphrey were charged with shop breaking.

The first two pleaded guilty. Police Magistrate Massie allowed Walter Latham, who is only 16 years of age, to go on suspended sentence on payment of costs. Wesley Nye, who is only 20 years of age was fined \$50.00 and costs or three months. Charles Latham and Thomas Humphrey at first pleaded not guilty but when the evidence of the first two was taken they pleaded guilty. According to the statement of the first two, the glass was taken out of the window and Walter Latham crawled in the window and unlocked the door and Wesley Nye came in and they stole four tubes and two tires. Charles Latham and Thomas Humphrey remained on guard. Charles Latham was sentenced to three months in goal without the option of a fine and Thomas Humphrey, who was 17 years of age, was sent to goal for not less than three months and not more than fifteen months.
