BOOST THE JARVIS FALL FAIR

— ON PARLIAMENT HILL —

OTTAWA, MARCH 28.—In the face of a net decrease in revenue of \$52,837,692 the King Government in the fiscal year ending March 31, 1925, was able to show a surplus of \$1,823,000 after ordinary capital and special expenditures had been taken care of. This is the most important feature of the fourth Budget to be submitted to Parliament by the present administration and the second to be presented by Hon. James A. Robb, Acting Minister of Finance. When there is added to that surplus the amount receivable from Greece and

Rumania as interest on the loans made to them by Canada during the war and which loans are now placed on a sound basis, the total surplus of the year to be used in reduction of the national debt is \$5,823,162. A levelling up of the duties on the slack and run-of-mine coal will be of great benefit to the Maritime Provinces; also the reduction of the duty on gasoline engines to be used by individual fishermen. An export duty of \$1.95 per horse power year on electricity developed in Canada will bring an additional revenue to the Dominion

of \$400,000 per annum, and altogether the increase in federal revenue from this year's proposed fiscal charges will, it is estimated by Hon. Mr. Robb, be \$1,322,118. A widening of the operation of the anti-dumping clause and the early functioning of the Tariff Board were, also, features of the Budget.

WARRANT TO PLEASE ALL SECTIONS
Developments in the Budget debate already indicate a repetition of the situation in the House of Commons two sessions ago, and also illustrate the exceeding difficulty of legislating and governing for a half continent. Two years ago the Progressives were annoyed at the failure of the Government to give any large downward revision of the tariff, with the result that in Parliament they moved a sub-

amendment to the Conservative main amendment to the Budget proposals. While the sub-amendment was voted out of order the Western group got themselves effectively on record as standing firmly for tariff reduction. That session the Government majority on the Budget was one of the smallest on record—only eight. Last session the Liberal Government made substantial reductions in the tariff, the estimated reduction in revenue as a result of these being \$26,000,000. The Progressives showed their appreciation and the largest Budget majority on record in Canada was registered—112. This year's fiscal proposals will be of material assistance to the eastern part of the Dominion. Last year's were of great encouragement to the western half. (Continued on Page 5)
