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## SUCCESSFUL BOYS' CONFERENCE OF HALDIMAND COUNTY HELD

On Friday, April 3rd, at 8 p.m. between 50 and 60 boys and leaders met in the Caledonia Presbyterian church for the opening session of the first Boys' Conference ever held in this county.

After the devotional period, which was taken charge of by the pastor of that church, the conference officers were elected.

Russell Walker, the local M.P.R.P., then gave an address in which he expressed the desire that all would cooperate for the purpose of "putting across" the C.S.E.T. program in this county.

Following this Calvert Rea, M.P.R.P., Cabinet Minister for this district, was called upon to tell a little of his five years' experience in C.S.E.T. work. Calvert certainly believes in this program. He named some of the outstanding individuals that the C. S. E. T. had produced.

The speaker of the evening, Mr. C. F. Plewman, Secretary of the Ontario Boys' Work Board, explained that the Tuxis Boys and Trail Rangers are fellows whose motto is, "The Quest of the Best," and who believed that it was a sin to be content with second best, and that the C.S.E.T. is the official program for the young people of all the Protestant churches of Canada.

Mr. Plewman said that one reason why the program was not known in every Protestant church was because the men do not look upon the training of boys in the Jesus' way of living as a man-sized job. He further remarked that religion was not apart from life, but that it was the keeping in harmony with God and in tune with our fellow men. He also mentioned that the C.S.E.T. program was the hope of the future Protestant church, and that leaders should regard boys' heads as thinking machines and not as hangers. The speaker proved very convincingly to the boys how necessary it was for them to be foursquare, if they would obtain the best in their intellectual, physical, religious and social life.

After a refreshing sleep and an enjoyable hour spent at the breakfast table of their hosts, a jolly group of boys assembled at the Baptist church for the second session.

After the opening exercises, Mr. Plewman gave an address in which he pointed out that the advancement of the C.S.E.T. program was a problem of leadership. The object of leadership training camps are to train men to share their lives with boys.

Following this, Walter Hill gave an address on "What It Means to be a Trail Ranger," and outlined some of his experiences as a Mentor.

At 12 o'clock over one hundred assembled around the beautifully decorated tables for a banquet in the Methodist school room, where every one fully satisfied the cravings of the inner man, and at which Mr. Plewman led in several snappy songs. After the banquet toasts were given to the King, the C.S.E.T., and the Ladies. Following this all adjourned to the church for the closing session.

A Tuxis Square from Port Colborne put on an example of a mid-week meeting, which was much appreciated by all, and all agreeing that the Port Colborne fellows were sure alive.

Harold Hoebel gave a short address on "What the Program Means to Us," in which he stated that we all had enjoyed the conference and the splendid fellowship which prevailed, and that we had heard the many advantages that program offers. His closing remarks were, "Unless we are willing to pay the price, the program can mean to us—nothing."

Mr. Plewman then gave the closing address, after which a hearty vote of thanks was given to all those who in any way aided the promotion of the conference.

At the close of the conference a Haldimand Boys' Work Board was organized, the officers of which are Rev. M. F. Oestreich, President; E. R. Bladman, Vice-President; R. Walker, Secretary, and James Gibson, Treas.

#### TAX ON 4.4 BEER TO BE TEN CENTS PER GALLON

Taxation of 5c per gallon on soft drinks, including beers containing up to 1 per cent by volume of absolute alcohol, and 10c per gallon on the new 4.4 beer is provided for in a bill introduced in the Legislature by Provincial Treasurer Price.

Mr. Price explained that the bill covered a tax on various kinds of soft drinks and wines in Ontario. Soft drinks of a certain alcoholic content would pay 5c per gallon. Subsequently he said that soft drinks such as ginger beer, ginger ale and sarsaparilla would come under the tax.

Ten cents a gallon would be imposed on soft drinks of a higher alcoholic content, namely, 4.4 beer. Mr. Price said. The bill also provides for a tax of 50c a gallon on native wines sold in Ontario.

#### EDITOR DIES IN DUNNVILLE

Dunnville, March 26.—The people of Dunnville late Tuesday learned with great regret of the death of William David Patterson, well-known local newspaper editor. Although he had not been well all winter, being troubled with indigestion and anaemia, a fatal termination was little expected.

He was born at Dunnville, on October 5, 1874, being a son of the late R. J. Patterson. Mr. Patterson had spent his entire life in Dunnville. When quite young he apprenticed with his uncle, Levi J. Wetherby of the Reform Press here, where he had been ever since. Upon the death of Mr. Wetherby several years ago, he purchased the paper and had put out a weekly edition ever since.

He was very prominent in Freemasonry, being a Pastmaster. He also held the chair of secretary of Amity Lodge, No. 32, Dunnville, for a great many years. He had occupied every post of the Live Oak Hose Co., especially that of secretary, for many years.

He leaves to mourn his loss, two sisters, Miss Roberta Patterson and Mrs. T. J. Wardell, Dunnville, also a half-sister, Mrs. James P. Melrose of Simcoe, as well as a stepmother, Mrs. Celia Patterson, Dunnville.

Mitchell, March 30.—For a number of years Miss Hattie Baker of Fullerton, has been interested in finding homes for boys who come from cities and who have not had a chance to make good.

At the present time she has 30 boys placed in good homes. Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore, Superintendent of the social service and moral reform work of the Methodist church, and Rev. W. E. Millson, also of the Social Service Department, furnish the boys for Miss Baker. There is talk of starting a boys' farm in Fullerton, and in connection with this a meeting was held at the home of Miss Baker on Saturday and the following were present: Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore, Rev. W. E. Millson, Rev. A. E. Thompson of London, Dr. Forester of Stratford, F. A. Campbell of Mitchell and H. R. Greenwood of Fullerton.

A committee of seven was appointed to supervise the movement, and in all probability in another year a boys' farm in Fullerton will be a reality.—Toronto Globe.

Miss Baker's work has always been followed with great interest by her friends here. The Baker family were at one time neighbors of and attended the same church as the Roberts' family. Marshall Roberts was a classmate of Miss Baker in the Fullerton school.
