PASSING OF A PIONEER IN THE DEATH OF JOHN BROWN

John Brown died in the Township of Woodhouse on Wednesday, April 22nd, 1925, aged 97 years.

Deceased was born in the town of Napanee in the year 1828. Moving with his father and the rest of the family to Caledonia when he was 17 years of age (1845), they settled near Caledonia on what is now known as the Indian Reserve, Township of Tuscarora. About the year 1857 the last Indian Treaty centred the Six Nations upon the Reservation they now hold, whereupon all the white settlers were forced to move from that district. The family then settled near Jarvis, and the deceased was employed, at first with the late Chambers Shannon, south of the village for one year; when he engaged for farm work with the late Robert McNeill, for whom he labored five years. In the year 1864 he married Miss Elizabeth McNeill, and one year later moved with his wife and infant son, Thomas, to the farm on which he died.

Building a log shanty by his own labor and the help of an axe, he cleared 150 acres of virgin soil, and brought it under cultivation. By his energy and perseverance he has left behind him an accumulation of wealth taken from the soil, and what is of greater account a character noted for his rightness and honesty.

He leaves behind him his wife, two sons, Thomas of Walpole, and Neil of Woodhouse; three daughters, Margaret, wife of Robert Miller, Walpole; Ellen, wife of James Mitchell, of Jarvis, and Elizabeth, wife of John Wadhams, of Walpole. A large family of eight brothers and three sisters predeceased him.

With his passing another link with the pioneer days is gone; and also another of the band of stalwarts who by toil and energy have laid the foundations of our national greatness.

The funeral, which was largely attended, was held on Friday, April 17, at his home. After services, conducted by Rev. W. T. Brown, the body was interred in the family plot at Jarvis. The pallbearers were: Thomas and Neil Brown, James Mitchell, Robert Miller, John Wadhams and W. Clarke.

MODERN PITFALLS SEEN IN THIS DRAMA OF LIFE

DEATH SUMMONS HEAD OF NIAGARA DIOCESE

On the eve of the joint celebration of the jubilee of the diocese of Niagara and of his ordination to holy orders, and in the fourteenth year of his term as bishop, death laid its hand upon Rev. William Reid Clark, M.A., D.D., D.C.L., lord bishop of Niagara.

The day before Palm Sunday his lordship was suddenly stricken with a fistula in the ear. The disease failed to respond to the skill of the best physicians and about midnight, April 18th, at the age of 77, and after 50 years' labor in the church, his lordship was called to higher service.

Not only in the diocese of Niagara did this announcement occasion profound sorrow, but throughout the Dominion generally the passing of Bishop Clark will be conceded to be a great loss to the Church of England and to the cause of Christianity.

Bishop Clark is survived by his widow and six children: Percy, in Detroit; Mrs. R. S. Cutbill and Mrs. Thomas Farmer, of Hamilton; Mrs. Eric Powell and Mrs. A. A. Cooper, of Toronto, and Miss May Clark, at home. Another son, Ernest, predeceased him about 15 years ago.

The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon, 2 o'clock, from Christ's Church cathedral to St. John's cemetery, Ancaster.

Ven. Archdeacon Irving of Jarvis, acted as one of the honorary pallbearers.
