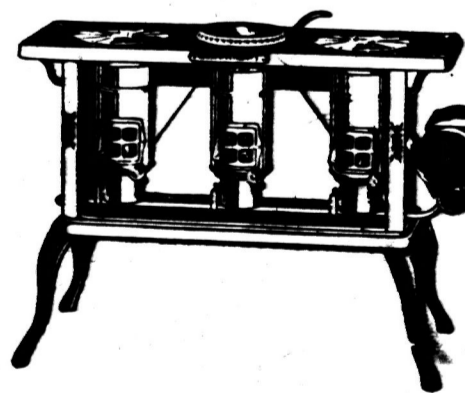

## AUGUST ROD AND GUN

In addition to a full quota of unusually interesting stories and articles, the August number of "Rod and Gun in Canada," the Canadian sportsman's magazine, contains a wealth of information for the outdoorsman, the fisherman and the gun crank in the regular articles and full synopses of the hunting and fishing seasons and laws, for the province of Canada and Newfoundland. Other articles equally good contribute to make the issue a highly attractive one.
