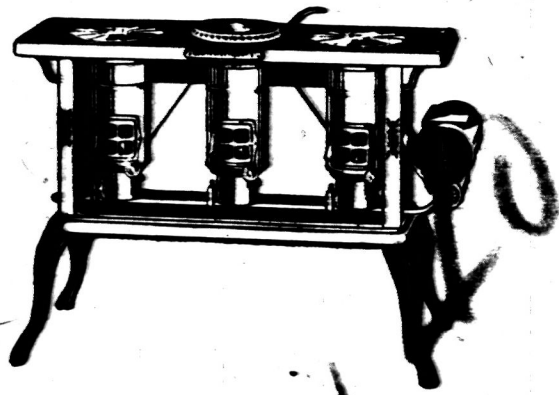

ANNUAL ESSEX COUNTY FARMERS' EXCURSION

The annual Essex County farmer's auto excursion is really now no longer either a farmer's excursion or strictly an Essex county excursion. Although the majority of tourists are farmers, a goodly percentage are town and city business men and their wives. And every year, larger numbers of residents of adjoining counties are taking advantage of the trip. A larger proportion of ladies attend each year, so that it now bears the character of a family excursion.

The auto excursion is organized by Essex County branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. All arrangements in regard to meetings, meals, rooms, educational features and the entertainment program are completely organized long in advance. The excursion is personally conducted and at all points, personally managed by the department of agriculture.

This service is absolutely free. The total cost to those who attend are their travelling expenses while on the trip. And because of the numbers who go, these costs are remarkably low; considering the mileage and time length of the tour. From \$20 to \$30 has been the average cost per individual, depending on the nature and length of the tour. This year the costs should be rather below the average.

The excursion this year will last six days, leaving Essex early Monday morning, August 31st and returning Saturday night, September 6th. The greater points of interest will be the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, and the Niagara Peninsula, including Niagara Falls. The cars will be assembled in Chatham and will leave in a body at 8.30 a.m. the morning of the 31st Aug. via the Northern route. On Saturday, Sept. 5th, they will return from Welland via the Southern route and that afternoon will disband at Blenheim. Cars from more distant centres may join the excursion and again may leave it at most convenient point.

Guelph, Toronto, Niagara

Monday, Aug. 31—Essex to Chatham, London, Woodstock. Dinner at Woodstock. Visit one famous dairy farm Oxford county. Proceed via Galt to Guelph. Supper and lodging Ontario Agricultural College.

Tuesday, Sept. 1—All day at O. A. C. Macdonald Institute and city of Guelph. Meals and lodging at the college.

Wednesday, Sept. 2—Drive to Toronto, visit Parliament buildings and University. Afternoon at Exhibition in group tour. Supper on grounds, evening in grandstand. Stay in Toronto that night.

Thursday, Sept. 3—Morning open for shopping, city sight-seeing or visiting exhibition. Noon dinner at Ex. After dinner drive via Hamilton high way and Burlington beach road to Vineland Experimental station. Tea at station, drive to St. Catharines for night.

Friday, Sept. 4—Drive to Niagara Falls, visiting all points of interest. Noon dinner in Niagara Falls. Visit some outstanding farms in Lincoln and Welland counties. Supper and lodging in city of Welland.

Saturday, Sept. 5—Drive via Southern route homeward through Simcoe to St. Thomas for dinner. Proceed from St. Thomas to Blenheim. Disband officially at Blenheim, reaching home by nearest route.

Everyone Is Welcome

Every community is invited to make up a carload of relatives, neighbors or friends and come along. The tour is organized for people from town and country and for men and women. The educational and the entertaining are well balanced and there is something for everyone.
