TO REOPEN SESSION MONDAY, JANUARY 4

SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS AT CALEDONIA

The school is the largest in the Province of Ontario this year. During the month of December 59 young men enrolled and 72 young women, making a total of 131 students, with an average attendance of 43 for Agriculture and 63 for Home Economics.

The school will open the winter session on Monday, January 4th. The subjects which will be taken up under Home Economics are: Millinery, Jan. 4th to 15th; Sewing, Jan. 18th to Feb. 12th; Nursing, Feb. 1st to 26th. In addition lectures will be given in Household Administration, English and Music.

The subjects for Agriculture are: Field Husbandry, Jan. 4th to 15th; Marketing, Jan. 18th to 29th; Veterinary Science, Jan. 18th to 29th; Botany, Jan. 18th to 29th; Farm Management, Jan. 28th to Feb. 5th; Poultry, Feb. 8th to 12th; Farm Forestry, Feb. 4th and 5th; Dairying, Feb. 8th to 12th; Soils and Fertilizers, Feb. 15th to 27th.

These courses should prove of interest to the rural people of the county. We are looking forward to the return of all the students we had in December and will welcome any new students who wish to enroll during the months of January and February.

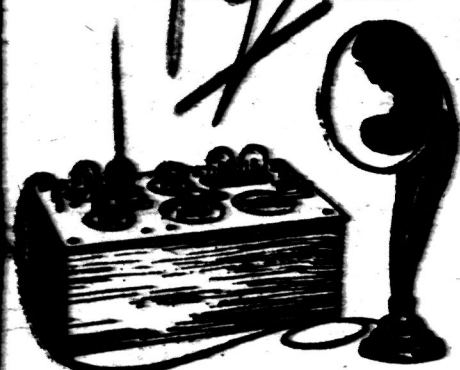
