ONT. TOOK MANY PRIZES

FINE SHOWING OF HOLSTEINS AT NATIONAL DAIRY SHOW.

Ontario Department of Agriculture Assisted in Selection and Shipping—State Herd Prize Comes to This Province.

Ontario Holstein breeders have again won a notable success at the National Dairy Show, which this year was held in Indianapolis.

Ten Ontario breeders entered twenty-four animals—nineteen females, and seven males—these twenty-four animals against approximately three hundred of the cream of American herds.

These Ontario farmers through the excellence of their stock were able to win individual prizes on eighteen of the twenty-four animals shown. The six animals not winning prizes were made up of: four heifer calves, 1 bull calf, all of which were not as extreme in size as their American competitors, and consequently were hardly in a condition to compete in 1925, but another story might be told if these same calves were returned a year from now. The sixth animal, a four-year-old cow, while not winning a prize, stood eleventh in a class of seventeen, being just outside the prize money.

The complete report of the winnings shows that Ontario breeders won: 4 firsts, 3 seconds, 4 thirds, 2 fourths, 1 fifth, 2 sevenths, 1 eighth, 2 tenths, and in addition, won the Senior and Grand Champion female, Junior Champion male and first in the State Herd, which is the most coveted prize put up by the National Dairy Exposition. The report of such winnings by representatives from the herds of Ontario should be an excellent advertisement for the breed and the breeders, and in this connection it is well to note that this notable achievement by Ontario men was made possible through the Ontario Department of Agriculture assisting the shipment of live stock to a foreign exhibition. The assistance given consists of payment of the freight on exhibits, payment of entry fees, and certain other expenses in connection with the dressing and advertising the exhibit.

It was generally conceded at Indianapolis that the Ontario exhibit was one of the most uniform, and of highest average quality in that great show of Holsteins. The exhibit was also well staged and altogether it was one of the most attractive points of interest in the exhibits at the exhibition.

Sanft Stages Big Winter Classic



A world-championship dog derby to the "Top of the World and Back" will be run for the first time in the history of dog-mushing at the Banff Winter Carnival this year, according to plans now being made by the Banff committee under President Standish. The course from Calgary to the Great Divide and back to Banff will be the longest dog race in the world and will exceed the famous Pas Derby by 23 miles. The Strongheart Trophy and one thousand dollars will go to the winner.

From Calgary, the starting point, the dog teams will travel to a height of 5,300 feet over a distance of 133 miles. This point is the Great Divide, the backbone of the North American continent, which in the Canadian Rockies separates Alberta from British Columbia. The contestants will then return to Banff via Lake Louise, completing the distance of 173 miles. The course lies over the most rugged scenery in America and will be the most unique run ever made by dog and sled.

This world-championship dog derby will be made an annual event at the Banff Winter Carnival from now on. Among the famous mushers who have already signed up for the race are: Mr. Mills with his team of famous all-black; Harry Knight, the 19-year-old boy who has twice already won the Strongheart Trophy and will have to win it only this year to come into possession of it; Jim Thompson, Fred Pepper, George Child and others of less note. The end of the race will be celebrated by a big buffalo hunt.

A special train will run from Calgary to Banff to allow those who saw the teams start to view the finish.

The Banff Winter Carnival, which has now become one of the big Canadian winter classics, will extend over two weeks this year, from February 3 to the 17th.

Another feature of this year's events will be the ski-jumping contests over the new, enlarged hill, which will be participated in by Nels Nelson, the Canadian Pacific Railway brakeman who holds the world's championship in both the amateur and professional classes.

To enable the winter visitors to Banff to see something of the scenery, Bill Potts, famous Rocky Mountain guide, will bring in twenty horses to be used to pull ski-journeys and tobogganers to scenic points in the surrounding mountains.

Other features of the ice carnival will be the ladies' hockey championships and skating contests for all classes, swimming contests in the famous hot sulphur pools; ski and ski-joring races and the packing and saddle contests by the famous Rocky Mountain guides of West Canada. Dog teams will be used to taxi the visitors instead of the familiar Banff summer automobile. These teams will be provided by the Brewster Transport Company. The city of Calgary having this year discontinued their own carnival to join forces with the Banff classic. It is expected that the coming Banff Carnival will be the biggest in the history of the Rockies.
