### Report of Road and Bridge Committee

To the Warden and Members of the County Council.

Gentlemen: We, your Road & Bridge Committee have met and appointed W. J. Saunders chairman and beg leave to report at your next meeting.

McQuillan-Lyons—That the report of the Road and Bridge Committee be adopted as read. Carried.

Kern-Kriter—That the Building Committee be appointed to take up the matter of the telephone for the Cour House with the Erie Telephone Company and unless the Company at its meeting on Thursday agrees to instal the telephone, that the Building Committee be instructed to lay the matter before the Ontario Railway Board at once. Carried.

French-Kern—That a by-law be introduced and read a first time authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow one hundred thousand dollars from the Canadian Bank of Commerce for current expenses repayable on the 31st of December, 1925, with interest at 6%. Carried.

Sherk-Lockie—That the by-law authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow one hundred thousand dollars from the Canadian Bank of Commerce be read a second time. Carried.  
Glenny-Lyons—That the by-law authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow one hundred thousand dollars from the Canadian Bank of Commerce be read a third time, signed, sealed and entitled a by-law as in the original motion. Carried.

Camelford-McDonald—That this Council do now resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole with Reeve McQuillan in the chair. Carried.

McDonald-Camelford—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. Carried.

Wingfield-Glenny—That the report of the Committee of the Whole be received and read. Carried.

## NEWSPAPERS

Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post office, whether addressed in his name or another's, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for payment. If a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken or not. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post office, or removing and leaving them unpaid, is prima facie evidence of intention of fraud.

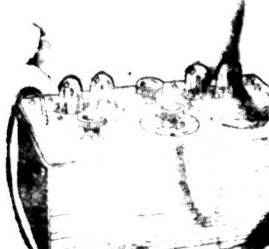
