ON PARLIAMENT HILL

With the opening of the 1925 session, we are resuming the weekly parliamentary letters reviewing the chief happenings in Commons and Senate and around Parliament Hill. REAL CAUSE FOR REGRET

The other day a "country weekly" closed up shop, after an existence of thirty years.

The item recording the happening had the bare announcement, and a few words intimating that the country weekly "is passing."

Not one word of regret! And yet, that little old newspaper did more for that small community than all the financiers, promoters, efficiency experts, politicians and other big fellows who have been in and out of the place in the last thirty years.

It is quite probable that every inhabitant of the locality owes that little old paper a debt of gratitude—and, possibly, a good many of those who have come and gone in the 30 years owe it other debts, which may have had something to do with the "passing" of the paper.

A country weekly may not be the life-blood of its territory, but it has very much to do with the lubrication required to keep things moving.

The local paper is the clearing-house of the community. There's more real news in a column of its items than in a page of the horrors, near-horors and bunk sensations and fabrications that decorate the front pages for most of the city papers.

It is a hopeless community that is without some pride in itself, and so dumb as to forget that the last place upon which the shutters should be

BISHOP CLARK CONSIDERS O.T.A. CHANGES SENSIBLE

High Rev. W. R. Clark, bishop of Niagara (Anglican), said regarding the announcement of a change in the Ontario Temperance Act:

"My opinion of this prohibition question has figured largely in my charges during the past two years. I would not condemn any man for taking a drink of five per cent. beer. To increase the penalties for bootleggers and illicit traffickers, and reduce them for those merely having it for their own use, is a much more sensible view. It is a wise and fairer method."

"This issue has got into politics, in which I wish to take no part. I'm trying to look at the moral and spiritual side. No body wants drinking to become more prevalent than it is now; it is quite bad enough. I believe this government will do its best to remedy conditions. It will have my support until it fails in that duty. I think Premier Ferguson has done splendidly and taken a splendid stand in this matter. He wants to be fair to all."

"The government evidently wants to stamp out bootlegging. It is costing millions to try to enforce the act and we are not getting any return. There is a great deal of drinking and bootlegging going on, and a lot of poisonous liquor being sold. So it is well worth while trying a new method. Apparently this is a step in the right direction."

NEWSPAPERS

Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post office, whether addressed in his name or another's, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for payment. If a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken or not. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post office, or removing and leaving them unpaid, is prima facie evidence of intention of fraud.

—ON PARLIAMENT HILL— By a Member of the Parliamentary Press Gallery

OTTAWA, Feb. 14.—The curtain is up, the stage set and the actors have taken their respective roles in the annual drama on Parliament Hill. The first week has assigned to the government side of the stage a dominant, unified array with constructive legislative goals clearly defined and to be reached with a minimum of talk or time-wasting. In the Conservative corner Mr. Meighen and his resolute phalanx have essayed the role of Jeremiah, lamenting long and loud the country's economic ills but not specifying very clearly as to the specific remedies or just what acts would be met for repentance. Mr. Forke and his Progressives in the left back centre of the Commons stage have so far rather assumed the role of watchful waiting a benevolent neutrality so far as the Government is concerned with amild applause for what the Government has done so far and a promise of support if the good work is continued.

CONSTRUCTIVE AND PRACTICAL LEGISLATION

The Government's general program of legislative action this season, as disclosed by the Speech from the Throne, is constructive and practical. It is a sequel to the legislation of last session designed to reduce the cost of living and improve both domestic and export trade. The keynote of the speech was the emphasis laid upon the urgent necessity of lowering the cost of living, not so much by further reductions in the tariff, as by the more direct way of reducing the cost of transportation, on land and sea. It makes plain, too, that along with a lowering of the cost of transportation another big factor is encouragement of production, and the most effective way of increasing production is by strengthening the immigration campaign.

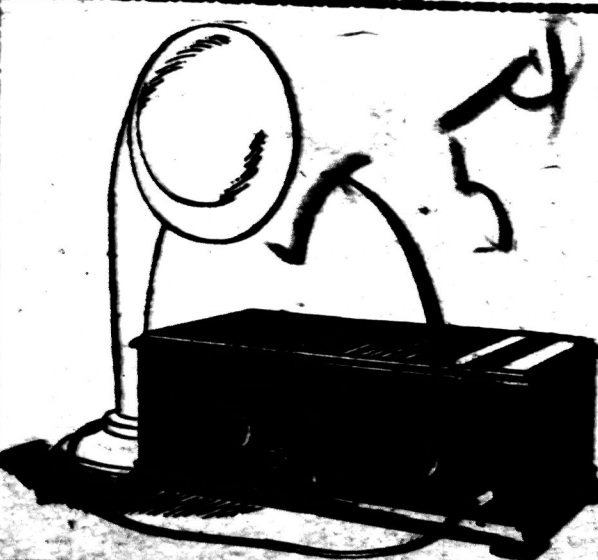
