FIVE PERSONS WERE BURNED TO DEATH AND OTHERS SEVERELY BURNED

Brantford, Dec. 18.—Five persons, including three children, a woman and an aged man, were burned to death. and several others were injured in a fire which destroyed a small house or the Six Nations reserve between Cale. clock this morning. The dead are Walter. George Smith, 72; Mrs. Thomas Secord, 40; Maggie Secord, 5; Annie Turkey, 8; Bessie Turkey, 10.

Mrs. Levi Turkey was seriously burned and is in a critical condition in the Hamilton hospital. Joseph Smith, about 30 years old; James Turkey, 5 years old, and a 9-months-.75 old baby received slight burns.

The fire started when, about 4 o'clock this morning, Wilson Secord, an 8-year-old boy, got up and went 16.90 to the medicine cabinet to get his 13.20 little brother a dose of medicine. He lighted a match, which ignited the caper curtains of the cupboard and the fire-blazing up caught some tow-5.95 els hanging close by and quickly 36.15 spread to the walls.

The house was a tiny one, measuring about 24x18 feet, and was of the 8.30 old log construction, all the material of its walls and roof as dry as tinder. There were sixteen persons in the 10.64 house at the time, and the blaze in a 30.00 few moments enveloped the inflamable structure, and caught them like rats in a trap.

With the exception of the Second 4.50 family, who were Chippawas, all the 27.20 occupants were Six Nations Indians.
