FATAL BURNING ON RESERVE

FIVE PERSONS WERE BURNED;
TO DEATH AND OTHERS
SEVERELY BURNED

Brantford, Dec. 18.—Five persons, including three children, a woman and an aged man, were burned to death, and several others were injured in a fire which destroyed a small house on the Six Nations reserve between Caledonia and Sour Springs, about 4 o'clock this morning. The dead are George Smith, 72; Mrs. Thomas Secord, 40; Maggie Secord, 5; Annie Turkey, 8; Bessie Turkey, 10.

Mrs. Levi Turkey was seriously burned and is in a critical condition in the Hamilton hospital. Joseph Smith, about 30 years old; James Turkey, 5 years old, and a 9-months-old baby received slight burns.

The fire started when, about 4 o'clock this morning, Wilson Secord, an 8-year-old boy, got up and went to the medicine cabinet to get his little brother a dose of medicine. He lighted a match, which ignited the paper curtains of the cupboard and the fire-blazing up caught some towels hanging close by and quickly spread to the walls.

The house was a tiny one, measuring about 24x18 feet, and was of the old log construction, all the material of its walls and roof as dry as tinder. There were sixteen persons in the house at the time, and the blaze in a few moments enveloped the inflammable structure, and caught them like rats in a trap.

With the exception of the Secord family, who were Chippawas, all the occupants were Six Nations Indians.

OBJECT TO THE 50c GAS RATE

AT LAST MEETING OF ONEIDA
COUNCIL THE FOLLOWING
RESOLUTION CARRIED

That the Council of the Township of Oneida place themselves on record as being opposed to the Dominion Gas Co. charging the consumers of gas to our Township 50c per M. for the following reasons: According to the bylaws of the Township, the gas was to be furnished to the residents along all lines at 25c per M. These bylaws have been upheld as properly legal by His Honor Judge Hopkins, in the County Court at Cayuga and have never been appealed. For a number of years the company has been charging 45c per M. and after the judgment was given last a number of consumers objected to payment of more than 25c per M. The company then cut off the supply for a few days, causing a few to buy stoves. Later the gas was turned on again, and an interim rate of 50c per M. has been charged since. We are a producing township, having about 35 wells owned by the Dominion Gas Company and about 10 miles of 19-inch transmission lines crossing the township. We feel that we should not be charged a higher rate than non-producing municipalities. There have been complaints from people living in the gas districts that a number of water wells have been completely drained when near the gas wells, and they believed it to be due to some defect in the drilling or care of the wells. As this is a producing township some of the residents are subject to the same danger. In view of this fact, some allowance should be made in the price of gas.
