SUN TO BE COMPLETE- LY DARKENED BY MOON

Sweeping across Southwestern Can-
ada at a speed of 1,500 miles an
hour, the moon's shadow cast on the
earth during the next total eclipse of
the sun, on January 24, 1925, will
cut off all the sun's light from To-
ronto for a little over a minute at
9:06 1/2 a.m. The whole face of the
sun will be blotted out and stars may
be seen in the sky. Ursa Major, the
Great Dipper, will probably be vi-
sible in the north-western sky, so Prof.
R. K. Young, associate in astronomy,
described the event in the Physics
Building.

In Toronto the eclipse may be best
observed from tall buildings and the
hilltops. Astronomers do not recom-
mend observations from the lake-
front, as mists will probably inter-
fere. About 9 a.m. the first bla-
ck mark, the edge of the moon, will be-
gin to eat slowly into the sun's sur-
face, until at 9:06 1/2 the sun is black,
framed in a circle of flame, the cor-
ona.

Goderich will be the first town in
Ontario exactly in the centre of total
eclipse, and the eclipse will last there
as in Clinton, Waterloo, Guelph, Galt,
Kitchener, Dundas, Hamilton, Wel-
land, Thorold and Bridgeburg, for 1
minute and 50 seconds, while in To-
ronto, it will only last one minute.

Just outside the edge of the dark-
ened area, from 0 to 10 miles, which
Prof. Young named, are Port Elgin,

Southampton, Windsor, Aurora, Affin-
ton, Forest, Waterford, St. Thomas
and Aylmer.

London is well inside, and so is Till-
amburg, Orangeville, Chesley, Har-
row and Durham are also just within
the edge. Prof. Young says that an
error of some two or three miles may
be expected in making the calcula-
tions of the eclipse's radius.

Opportunities for observation are
unique, he says, for the great bulk
of observers will not have an oppor-
tunity for the next 25 or 30 years of
seeing a total solar eclipse.
