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DOMINION NATURAL GAS CO.'S RATES INCREASED

PRICE OF GAS INCREASED TO FIFTY-FIVE CENTS, WITH A 5 PER CENT. DISCOUNT

The application of the Dominion Natural Gas Co., for an increase in rates, came up for a hearing at the Town of Cayuga, on Sept. 24th, 1924, that date having been fixed by agreement at a meeting held in the City of Hamilton on August 26th, 1924. The applicant company was represented by Major N. Sweet. Mr. R. S. Colter appeared for the Village of Cayuga, and the township of Raith. Mr. Lindsay represented the Township of Walpole and the Village of Jarvis. Mr. Robb appeared for the Township of Camboro. Mr. H. V. Meadows for the Township of South Cayuga. Mr. Bradford for the Township of Dunn and Moulton.

Their finding is as follows: The Board has given careful consideration to the evidence adduced at the hearing, as well as the arguments afterwards presented by certain of the solicitors. The evidence in the opinion of the Board showed clearly that it was necessary for conserving the supply and prolonging the service to consumers, and furthering the search for and development of new sources of supply of natural gas, to depart from or vary agreements, franchises or bargains shown to exist between the parties hereto.

The Board, however, in considering the entire situation find that there exists in the County of Haldimand, certain conditions which we feel to be of sufficient importance to cause us to refuse at the present time to set such rates as could be justified by the evidence. We find that certain other municipalities in the said county, not included in this hearing, are at present enjoying rates much lower than the evidence would justify us in fixing in the respondent municipalities, and we are of the opinion that consideration should be given to the whole community of municipalities which are similarly situated, and we know of no good reason why certain municipalities should pay much higher rates than those paid by adjoining municipalities in the same county and served under similar conditions.

We have decided, therefore, and we hereby authorize the applicant company to charge for all gas supplied by them to consumers in respondent municipalities from and after the 1st meter reading made about December 1st, 1924, the sum of 55c per thousand cubic feet from which amount an allowance of 5c per thousand (Continued on last page)

DEATH OF WELL KNOWN PASTOR

Rev. Harry G. Livingston, an outstanding divine in the Methodist church, passed away at his home, 44 Mountain avenue, Hamilton, on Monday night, following an illness of many years. His death removes one who was prominent and actively identified in the Hamilton Methodist conference. Deceased was also very well known in Jarvis and vicinity.

Born in Tillsonburg, Ont., June 18th, 1859, he received his early education at the Brantford and Hamilton colleges, and later attended Victoria College, Toronto. Deceased was in his 65th year. Left to mourn, besides his wife, formerly Mina Hager, daughter of the late Charles Hager, founder of Hagersville, Ont., are three sons, Charles H., of Toronto; Dr. Fred, of Cleveland, O.; and Harold A., of Hamilton; one daughter, Helen, at home, and one grandchild, John Allan, of Hamilton.

Deceased was for 13 years pastor of Barton Street Methodist church, now known as Livingston Methodist church. It was the longest continuous pastorate in the history of Canadian Methodism. Before assuming pastoral duties at the Barton street church he occupied the pulpit at Trafalgar, Bridgeburg, Otterville, Caledonia and Hagersville.

A private family service will be held on Thursday (today), at 2 p.m., thence to Livingstone Methodist church for public service. The body will be conveyed via 9:20 a.m. C. N. R., Friday to Hagersville for interment.
