and shall be made for payment of 30 cents within ten days from rendering of same. This rate is made as an interim rate, and shall cover a period from the said on or about 1st day of December, 1924, to the 1st day of June, 1925, and to continue thereafter until varied by the order of the Board.

Should an application be made to the Board by any of the parties hereto, for a reconsideration of the rates herein set, within one year from date of this order, the Board may consider such application. Listen to arguments thereon, and if in the opinion of the Board conditions have so changed within the county as to justify a re-hearing, a re-hearing may be ordered without further evidence in connection with the respondent municipalities, but upon evidence in the case of other municipalities being included in any such application.

On June 9th, 1924, the Board made an order fixing an interim rate of 55c per thousand cubic feet for the Townships of Seneca and Oneida, in the County of Haliburton, Glanville, Binbrook, and Barton in the County of Wentworth, and the Township of Castor in the County of Lincoln, and we order the same interim rate to remain in effect during the term of this order and subject to the conditions herein before cited, as in the main these last named municipalities are similarly situated to the respondent municipalities.

It should be noted that the Board in fixing this interim rate for the respondent municipalities, and also the interim rate in the last mentioned municipalities, is not departing from the principle established of what is known as the step up rate, but we feel that in consideration of existing conditions it is wise to set the rates as fixed herein for the present time.
