Referring to the pioneer days of agriculture in Ontario, Sir John Willison recalled that it was not so very long ago when a dickie and a celluloid collar was considered full dress; that one suspender during a period when, "We had but one God, and two political parties, one of which was more evil than the other."

This was sufficient evidence that although their number had decreased those left on the land had not declined in skill or intelligence, but had taken advantage of modern farm implements placed at their disposal.
