## PREDICTS A BANNER FOR ONTARIO FARMERS

Addressing the Municipal Bankers' Association, Limited, at a dinner recently given the officers and staff of the organization in the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, Sir John Willison, president, declared that during 1925, rural Ontario would experience one of the biggest years of expansion of any farming community in the world. Sir John made this prediction in proposing the toast, "Canada's Agriculture and Industries," which was responded to by Prof. J. B. Reynolds, of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. Sir John expressed the belief that the era of depression was fading and that prosperous times would again hover over the banner province of the Dominion.

Referring to the pioneer days of agriculture in Ontario, Sir John Willison recalled that it was not so very long ago when a dickie and a celluloid collar was considered full dress; that one suspender during a period when, "We had but one God, and two political parties, one of which was more evil than the other."

Sir John declared that freight rates between the East and the West must be reduced to a normal level, adding, "Cheaper freight rates are vital to the prosperity of Eastern and Western Canada and in that way lies our national security and prosperity."

Professor Reynolds said his duty as head of the Ontario Agricultural College was to reconcile the conflicting views of the farmers and the class designated by the farmers as the "big interests." Prof. Reynolds declared the problem of depopulation of the rural centres was not as great as some people believed. He expressed the belief that rural depopulation was a sign of rural progress, and proceeded to show that agricultural production in all its branches had shown a vast increase, almost 80 per cent. in some instances, during the past 20 years. This was sufficient evidence that although their number had decreased those left on the land had not declined in skill or intelligence, but had taken advantage of modern farm implements placed at their disposal. nolds stated there had been a marked development in the production of sugar beets, tobacco and fruit commodities which made a fine contribution to industry and the markets of Canada.

The farmers of Canada had shown no lack of adaptability and the door of opportunity must be kept open to them.

Dealing with the question of co-operative movements, Prof. Reynolds said the farmers had been most reluctant to organize in comparison to other great economic groups, which had resorted to such measures to guard their interests. He thought the farmer should have the right to protect his interests the same as the banker, the labor man, and commercial interests. The farmer was entitled to all the rights and privileges that other interests demand, concluded Prof. Reynolds.

Proposing to the toast to "Our Guests," Sir William Hearst averted that the development of Canada and Northern Ontario in particular, depended very much upon the newspapers of the country.

The press had a superhuman duty to perform in protecting the investing public against unsound financial fluctuations. The United States had virtually closed its doors to immigrants, which was a signal for the Federal and Provincial Governments to use discretion concerning the class of future settlers coming here to take part in the development of the vast natural resources of the vast unexplored territory of Northern Ontario.
