hotel, when about 60 members sat down to do justice to a well-filled table, which the proprietor, Mr. W. S. McCall, is in the habit of doing. When dinner was concluded, the president, Mr. W. Everett, made a few remarks and called on Mr. J. Lockie Wilson, Superintendent of Fairs, for a short address, when he praised the fair and the gentlemen that had the different departments to look after. Among other things he said there were 221,000 paid members belonging to the different fairs of the province, not including Toronto, Guelph, Ottawa and London. He emphasized the necessity of greater co-operation between the towns and cities and the country, that in generally speaking, the farmer was up against it. The farmer's produce was going down and what he has to buy is going higher. He thought there is too great a spread between the producer and the consumer and there is very little remedy until the press get together and charge each alike for their advertising. Some firms get their printing done at 8c per line and others in the same paper have to pay 40c per line. The press is all the time bringing the large firms to the fore, they advertise them day in and out. The consequences are, the big firms offer you a price very low and they get a boosted price to the consumer. Therefore, the small man has to charge as much as the big firm and sometimes higher. Mr. Wilson urged the necessity of having ladies on the fair board. Mr. Wm. Donley was next called upon, and he said a few appropriate words in commending the management the success that attended the fair. Mr. Nelson Hall was next called upon. He said that today was the 70th anniversary of his birth and that he had been on the fair board over 30 years. This concluded the after-dinner speeches, and after singing "God Save the King," adjourned to the council chamber to hear the report and elect the officers for the year.

Mr. W. Everett, the president, was asked to continue in office, but he declined on the ground that the honors should be passed along, so Mr. A. W. Smith was unanimously elected. Mr. W. Bowyer for 1st Vice President; Mr. R. Bolby, 2nd Vice President; Mr. Bramhill, Sec. Treas., and 21 directors were also elected. After putting through some routine business, the meeting was concluded after tendering Mr. Wilson a vote of thanks. Hon. John S. Martin sent his regrets at not being able to attend the meeting. Mr. Wilson said he was perhaps the busiest man in the Cabinet.
