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## GET YOUR SMOKED GLASSES READY FOR SAT., JAN. 24

THE SUN WILL BE DARKENED  
BUT ONLY FOR TWO MIN-  
UTES—JARVIS IN LINE

Cross word puzzles, weather prophecies and the Saturday markets will cease to be objects of interest on January 24th, when the solar system's supreme achievement of 500 years' preparation will become visible in all its glory in this section of the country. We refer to the total eclipse of the sun which is scheduled to take place at a few minutes after nine in the morning of that day.

January 24th will be the day of days for the astronomer as well as for the average citizen, who will be privileged to see a phenomenon which will probably never again be seen on the North American continent. Scientists estimate that it will be 800 years before it again visits this country, and anything might happen in 500 years.

Jarvis is favorably situated to observe the eclipse, being almost in the centre of the total eclipse belt, and the phenomenon will commence at 9:05 a.m. It will continue for one minute and 48 seconds, so scientists tell us, just the length of time that it takes the moon to cross the face of the sun.

When the eclipse reaches totality, the earth will not be in complete darkness, but will be pervaded with a light resembling moonlight. The effect will be uncanny and will give to many the impression that the world has come to an end.

In many places where total eclipses have occurred chickens have gone to roost and dogs have howled while this peculiar light pervaded the earth during the totality.

Everyone should look out for the shadow bands, wavy bands of light and shade that fit over the landscape and buildings just before and after the total eclipse. Also, they should look out for the interesting phenomenon known as "Bailey's Beads," which are seen as the thin, threadlike solar crescent breaks up into beads of light as the total eclipse is about to begin, and which are seen again just as it ends.

Look also for the scarlet solar prominence during the total eclipse which are flames of glowing gases of hydrogen and helium rising from the hidden surface of the moon to heights of thousands of miles and visible beyond the edge of the moon in queer forms and shapes.

But if you would observe these phenomena do not look at the sun through a telescope or any glass of considerable power as it may result in total blindness.

"There have been cases," says Prof. R. H. Kingston, of Western University, London, in speaking on this subject, "where sight has been lost entirely by looking at the sun through a telescope. It goes immediately and there is apparently no cure. No one should at any time look at the sun directly in this manner. If you want to see the eclipse on the morning of January 24th next, use a piece of smoked glass—that's all you'll need."

### REGAH THEATRE

#### "TONGUES OF FLAME"

"Tongues of Flame" adapted from the novel by that name by Peter C. Macfarlane, brings Thomas Meighan to the screen at the Regah Theatre, Hagersville, next Friday and Saturday, in the kind of a role in which the public likes him best.

In the Paramount picture, directed by Joseph Henabery, the man who made "A Sainted Devil," Tom plays "Hell Fire" Harrington, recently returned World War veteran who takes up the practice of law in a one-horse town. Bessie Love plays the role of the half-breed girl, Lahleet. Eileen Percy is cast as Billie Boland and Burton Churchill is her father, Cyril Ping, Nick Thompson and others complete the strong supporting cast.
