**SHIPPING HOGS IN
HOT WEATHER**

Special consideration must be given to the condition of hogs to be marketed in hot weather. A hog is a fat animal and cannot stand much heat. Most hogs are fed in pens and do very little moving about when warm or after feeding and yet, when hogs are to be marketed they are usually not only given a regular feed but are frequently given an extra heavy feed after which, instead of being allowed to lie about and keep cool, they are immediately chased out into the yard and driven for from two to twenty miles in the heating sun.

Hogs should be given no feed whatever when being delivered direct to the packing plant and fed only a small half of a normal feed when being shipped on cars at a country point. The hog then arrives at the destination not only in good shape for marketing, but in vastly better condition for grading.

John Duff & Sons, Limited, Hamilton, are paying a special price for hogs delivered at their plant which arrive in good condition and appear to be without feed. Prices are quoted for hogs off feed and drink for twelve hours. This does not mean that hogs should be kept without cold water, however.

For hogs loaded at country points and marketed for grading, Duff's are paying a price for off-car weights which will cover all normal shrinkage and will pay extra for hogs that are empty and show a light shrinkage. They have instructed all their buyers, however, not to take in any hogs which are full of feed or appear to be overheated when they arrive at the scales.

Many hogs have died this past week in the country loading yards or in the cars, and some on the trucks and wagons, on account of overheating due to too much feeding the morning of delivery and some of the packers are paying extra prices to encourage the farmers to bring their hogs in, in proper condition for shipping and grading.

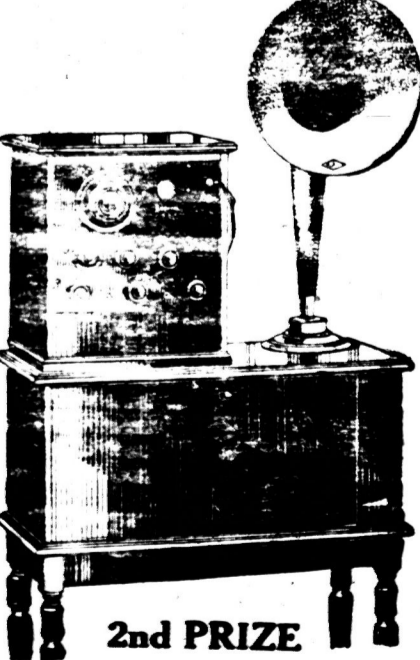
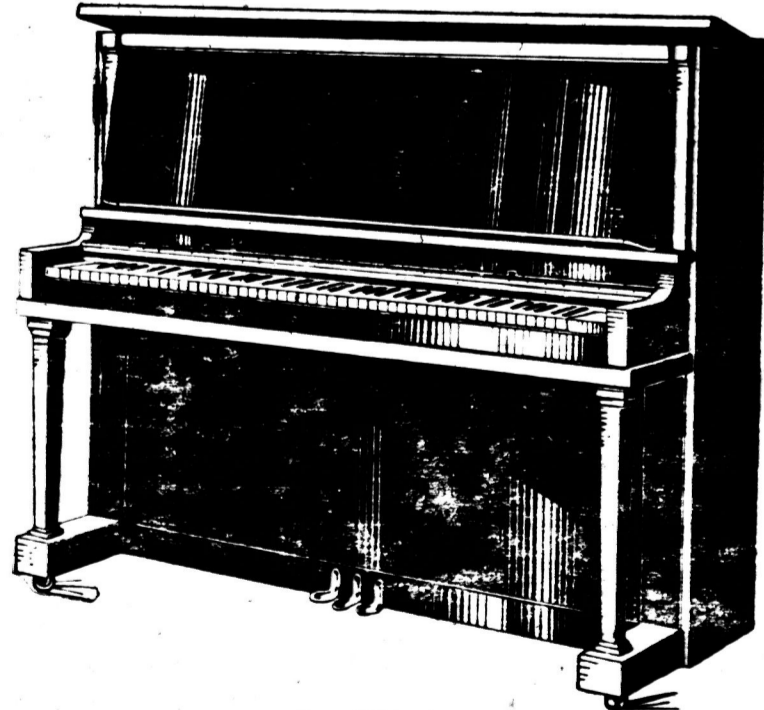
