ing. Mr. Roberts has been spoken of as a man of a large heart. I contend that he is "all heart" and a big soul. He has been referred to as the "Bishop of Lundy" Lane, which title would be quite appropriate, as he has surveyed his flock in no uncomplimentary manner. Mr. Roberts is fundamentally sound and his life reveals that what is absolutely necessary for success in any career — fundamental principles. He is the apex of Christian life in all his works and I wish him Godspeed in his new pastorate.

### WORTHY SEND-OFF

Rev. C. D. Draper, pastor of Morrison street Methodist church, said: "A worthy send-off is being given to a worthy pastor. This big gathering tonight is a compliment to his congregation and a compliment to Mr. Roberts. His cordiality to brother ministers has been a feature which has won him many friends in the ministerial world. We will miss his good fellowship in the International Ministerial Association which is composed of clergy from across the river, who will also regret his departure. Mr. Roberts always had a good word for a person, whether it be God, man or the devil. His frankness and cordiality are lovable qualities in his makeup and I shall personally miss him."

Mr. J. Gallinger, one of the Unionists who was formerly a member of Drummond Hill Presbyterian church, briefly paid a tribute to Mr. Roberts and said he would never forget the kindness Mr. Roberts had shown the Unionists from Drummond Hill Presbyterian church. "I am losing a good friend in Mr. Roberts and wish him every success in his new charge and my one regret is that Drummond Hill church did not enter the church union."

A cabinet of silver from the Niagara Falls Hockey club, presented by Mayor H. P. Stephens.

Rev. Mr. Roberts also received a club bag filled with gifts from Mr. and Mrs. George Morse, and a fancy quilt from the Ladies Aid.

To Mr. Roberts, housekeeper for Rev. Mr. Roberts, was presented a box of note paper, fountain pen and bouquet of roses from the Women's Missionary and Bible Class by Mrs. D. Nichols, also a jeweled bar pin from the Ladies' Aid society, presented by Mrs. Arthur Spencer.

To Eleanor and Margaret Roberts, little daughters of Rev. Mr. Roberts, were presented gold rings from Fred Harrison, superintendent of the Sunday school. ### GREAT HOCKEY FAN

Gene Fraser, captain of the Niagara Falls hockey team, in presenting his gifts referred to Mr. Roberts' keen interest in hockey and the great encouragement he gave the local boys at all the games by his presence and his "Come on Gene, Come on Gene" was always an inspiration to him when he passed Mr. Roberts' box at the hockey matches, and even when the games were slumping. Mr. Roberts, he said, would meet him on the street with the ever cheerful words, "She's got to come Gene."

In presenting the silver Mayor Stephens referred to the combination of splendid characteristics of Mr. Roberts whose departure was a regrettable loss to the city. Morally, religiously and socially Mr. Roberts is the highest type of man and if he returns here the latch string of Niagara Falls will always hang on the outside for Rev. H. L. Roberts.

Rev. Mr. Roberts amid tremendous applause endeavored to acknowledge the fine tributes and manifestations of esteem with which he had been surrounded. "I do not believe I am worthy of all these beautiful gifts," feelingly stated Mr. Roberts, "but I confess I am glad you have done this for the love and associations which each one of these remembrances has made, representative of every department in which I have worked with you. You have done a gracious and a most sympathetic thing which I can say simply embarrasses me to a degree and I do not know where to begin in thanks. It is a wonderful manifestation of appreciation, even presented here tonight, even without the gifts."

Mr. Roberts paid a tribute to the chairman, Dr. Snyder, for his services to the church, to his family and for the part he had taken in the function. Warmest words of praise were given to Gene Fraser by Mr. Roberts.

### BOOST FOR FRASER

"I could not help but cheer him on during those hockey matches. The captain of our senior hockey team in some ways could find. I think the world of Gene Fraser and his family and he is always engaged in the cleanest of sports. I had a lot of fun out of the hockey matches and the group picture will hang in my study and I will point with pride to Gene Fraser and will say 'See that big fellow there, he was a member of my church' and I am proud of all the boys of that team." Mr. Roberts referred to a splendid gift made to him in the afternoon by N. Malloch, jeweler, and from Mr. and Mrs. George Morse, a cith bag filled with gifts, all of which would be taken away with the fondest of memories. "During the seven years as pastor of this church, I have never heard a harsh word said or a ripple of discord and I am not going to Brantford because it is a bigger church or a bigger salary, but because I think it is in your interests." Mr. Roberts closed by expressing the hope that Old Folk's day and such special services which had been inaugurated in Lundy's Lane church would be continued and not die out as had been the case in other places. He referred to the loss by death, of his wife, which he sustained soon after coming to this city, who was a graduate of Toronto university and a wonderful helpmeet "and although I know my friends mean well when they say I need this or that, I do not purpose to jump from one climate into the other in this respect for any person or church."

"My closing word is that I love this church and love the people and any person who is an enemy to this church is my enemy. The real source of all success is God and if you continue to follow along His path, you will be crowned with ultimate success. I am coming back to Niagara Falls whenever I can and have been asked by several parishioners already to officiate at their weddings and funerals and I will always carry with me the fondest recollections and memories of my seven years spent in this fine city."

Refreshments were later served after which the good-byes were said and Mr. Roberts and little daughter left this morning for Brantford.—The Niagara Falls Gazette.
