## NANTICOKE OLD BOYS' REUNION

The Old Boys and Girls of Nanticoke began to stream homeward some days before the date set for the beginning of the celebration of a great Reunion and by Saturday night many had found the path home again.

The celebration opened with special services in the churches on Sunday. At the Anglican church the preacher was the Rev. C. E. Snowden, of Dallas, Texas. The preacher took for his text St. John 16:22, dwelling specially on the sentence "I will see you again." Mr. Snowden, who was born in Nanticoke, baptised and confirmed in Christ Church, said it was a great event in a man's life when after a long time away he could come home again, amid the old scenes, see the familiar faces, and meet old friends once more. One can never forget the land of his birth no matter how far away he may go. The preacher then reminded his congregation that the words of the text were spoken in an upper room the night before the betrayal of Christ. Every life in order to reach its highest and best must have an upper room, and upper rooms often mean a keen testing of faith and character. Jesus had many things to say to his disciples but they were not able to hear them then, but he told them enough, and they had understood so little that sorrow had filled their hearts. "And ye now," said Jesus, "have sorrow, but I will see you again and your heart shall rejoice, and your joy no man taketh from you." That is one of the glories of the Christian Gospel, that there will be a great reunion in the Eternal Homeland, where there will be no more partings, and where sorrow shall be done away, and He will see us again. Mr. Snowden made an earnest appeal for a life that should make Christ's words come true of all gathered in church, "I will see you again." The service was conducted by the Rector, Rev. C. J. Lamb, assisted by Rev. H. W. A. Brand, a former rector.

Special music was rendered by the choir, augmented by an Old Boys' choir, and by friends from St. John's choir, Thorold. The anthem "Rejoice in the Lord" was beautifully rendered. Mrs. F. 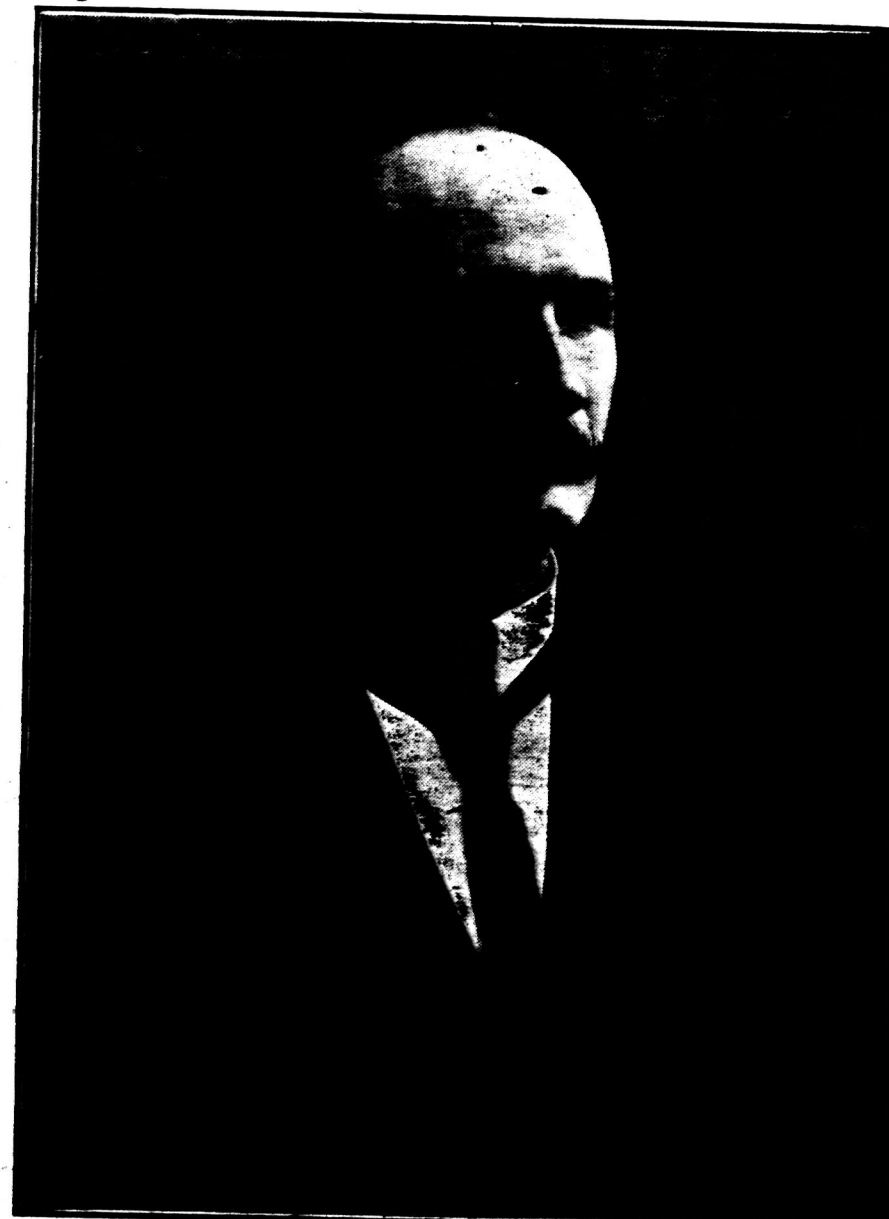
## BILL ELLIOTT FIRE CHIEF AT JARVIS
