**BREEDING TROUBLE**

Across the border State Legislatures veer from silliness to absolute and dangerous absurdities. Following the ridiculous action of Tennessee that is making that state a byword and laughing stock all over the enlightened world the Florida legislature comes along with a piece of legislation that is vicious and has the elements of a bitter and lasting fight. A bill has been passed in that state requiring Bible reading in public schools. This is a grave misstep and can only result in dissension and strife.

It is worse than folly to inject religious dissensions into the public schools. The governor of Ohio recently vetoed such a bill and in doing so set a good example for other governors where legislators take a foolish powder and pass from silliness to recklessness.

Floridians will find something to worry about other than the uncertainties of the crop of northern buyers of swamp and sand.

The battle will begin when school officials are called upon to decide which version of the Bible shall be read to the children of various religions.

Gentlemen—Your Good Roads Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. We have examined the paylists and accounts for the month of June and recommend that they be paid.

2. The following construction on the County Highway System has yet to be completed:

- Road No. 3—1 mile MacAdam base.
- Road No. 7—1/4 mile gravel base.
- Road No. 11—1 1/2 miles MacAdam base to be laid and 4 miles to be rolled and dusted.
- Road No. 15—3 miles to roll and dust.
- Road No. 18—1 1/2 miles to roll and 5 miles to dust.
- Road No. 19—2 1/2 miles MacAdam base.
- Road No. 21—2 miles of MacAdam base and 7 miles to roll.
- Road No. 24—7 miles to roll and dust.
- Road No. 25—2 1/2 miles to roll and dust.
- Road No. 26—1 mile to roll and dust.
- Road No. 29—1/2 mile gravel base.
- Road No. 30—3 miles to roll and dust.
- Road No. 31—1 1/2 miles to roll and dust.
