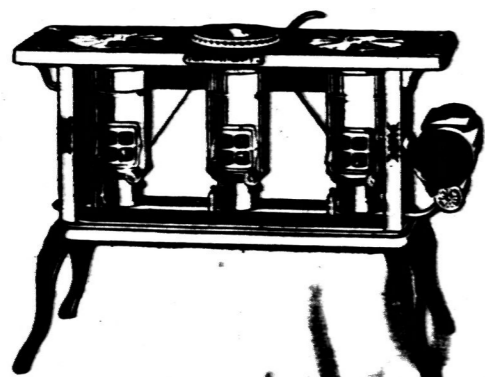

## AUGUST ROD AND GUN
