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FARMERS' DAY AT ONTARIO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

HEED AT GUELPH ON TUESDAY, JUNE 9—PROGRAM OF THE DAY AND TOURS

Visitors that arrive before lunch hour (12 o'clock) can spend the time going over the exhibits of the Science Departments.

Lunch in Gymnasium from 12 to 1 o'clock.

TOUR ONE

Conducted tour for those interested in Field and Animal Husbandry will leave Gymnasium immediately after lunch and proceed to Field and Husbandry Plots. One and one-quarter hours on the plots with Dr. Zavits and staff, and then on to swine, beef cattle and dairy cattle with Professor Toole and staff, for three-quarters of an hour. At 3 o'clock the party leaves dairy barn. Those interested in poultry will be conducted over the poultry plant, and those interested in dairy manufacture will be conducted to the dairy building.

TOUR 2

A conducted tour for those interested in Horticulture and Poultry will leave the Gymnasium immediately after lunch and proceed to the Horticulture Department, spending one and one-quarter hours with Professor McLennan and staff, and then on to the Poultry Department with Professor Graham and staff for three-quarters of an hour. At 3 o'clock party will proceed to Dairy Building.

TOUR 3

For Ladies—A conducted tour will leave the Gymnasium immediately after lunch and proceed to Macdonald Institute, and spend one hour and a half with Miss Cruikshank and staff, and then on to the Dairy Building, spending one half hour with Professor Dean and staff. The exhibits in these two departments will be of special interest to women.

At 3 o'clock, when all parties meet at the Dairy Building, those visitors desiring to go to Poultry, Horticulture, Apiculture Departments, or the Dairy Barn, will be conducted there-to.

Staff officials will be in all buildings from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day, ready to give information and advice on questions of agricultural science and practice.

An Information Bureau or Campus Directory will be established in a tent near the Gymnasium, for convenience of visitors.

At 4 o'clock the campus will be available to the Junior Farmers for baseball games or such other sports as they may see fit to conduct.

Come with the crowd to the O.A.C. on Tuesday, June 9th, and enjoy a very entertaining and instructive day.

Haldimand District Women's Institutes held their annual meeting in the Methodist church, Canfield, on Friday, May 29th. About 142 delegates attended in the morning, while at the afternoon session the church was filled to capacity.

Morning Session

The morning session opened with the Opening Ode and Rev. Mr. Trueblood offering prayer. Mrs. Peart, county president, gave a short address and the secretary-treasurer's report followed. The medal offered for pupil having highest standing in county on Entrance examination, was discussed; also conference of branch presidents and secretaries to be held in September at Nelles Corners. The branch reports occupied the balance of the forenoon. Resolutions Committee appointed was: Mesdames Payne, Mitchener and Berry.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session opened with address of welcome by Mrs. J. Badgley, to which Mrs. J. L. Mitchener replied.

PT. DOVER HARBOR PROVIDED FOR IN ESTIMATES

In an official letter to R. M. Taylor, ex-warden of Norfolk County, Dr. J. H. King, minister of public works, states that on the advice of his engineers and after giving serious consideration to the representations by Mr. Taylor and others in Port Dover, he has decided to include in his supplementary estimates a sum for the work at Port Dover harbor. This will, of course, have to be passed on by his colleagues on the treasury board and later presented to the House, but Pt. Dover can rest assured that something will be included. Mr. Taylor has in his possession a sheaf of letters that have passed back and forth in connection with this work which is evidence of the fact that despite his being confined to his bed he has not let the matter be shelved by the authorities at Ottawa, and he is determined to keep at it till the port gets the consideration that its importance warrants.—Port Dover Maple Leaf.
