THE LATE SAMUEL ROSS

The sudden death of Samuel Ross on Monday, May 18th, came as a great shock to the citizens of Port Dover. Mr. Ross had the contract for the carrying of H.M. Mails to and from the station and on Monday he brought up the mail as usual and put the horse in the stable. Going into the house he sat down in a chair and within 15 minutes he passed away.

Born at King, Ontario, in 1857, he was the third son of John and Ann Ross. When he was but an infant the family moved to Port Dover and Sam attended the Port Dover school. When he was 16 years of age they moved to a farm on Broadway.

In 1888 he married Margaret Evans, of Nanticoke, and they then took up residence on the Lake Shore road, where they resided until 10 years ago, when they moved again to Port Dover, occupying a beautiful residence on Main street.

The late Mr. Ross is survived by his wife, one son, Hugh Ross (on the Lake Shore road) and two daughters, Mrs. George Hallam, of Port Dover, and Mrs. Gregory of Toronto, also two brothers: Charles of Port Dover and John of Hamilton; and four sisters: Mrs. Davidson and Mrs. Alfred Ross of Hamilton and Mrs. Gunning and Miss Ross of Simcoe.

Mr. Ross was highly esteemed and much respected by all in the community. The large attendance at the funeral bore testimony to this, many being present from Nanticoke and other points. The service was in charge of Rev. D. J. Cornish, and following a short private service at the house, the funeral took place from St. Paul's church. Mr. Cornish was assisted by Rev. Mr. Lamb of Nanticoke. There were many beautiful floral offerings, those silent tributes of esteem to a departed friend. The pallbearers were all old friends of the late Mr. Ross. Interment was made in Port Dover cemetery.

OCEAN RATES INQUIRY

Outside the House the big feature of the past few weeks has been the investigation into the question of the ocean freight rates by the Special Committee appointed for that purpose and the chairman of which is Andrew R. McMaster (Brome). It is expected that the work of taking evidence will probably be completed at the end of next week after which the Committee will have to go through a mass of evidence, much of it of a documentary nature. Then they will have to draft a report on the question of the proposed contract between the Federal Government and Sir William Petersen by which the former proposes to get control of the ocean freight rates. Sir William himself will be the witness next week and on what he testifies will in large part rest the nature of the report to be made by the Committee. There has been an abundance of evidence substantiating the Government's charge that there is a combine on the North Atlantic controlling ocean rates and keeping them so high as to injuriously affect Canadian trade and industry. The question now to determine is whether or not the proposed subsidy scheme will adequately meet the situation.
