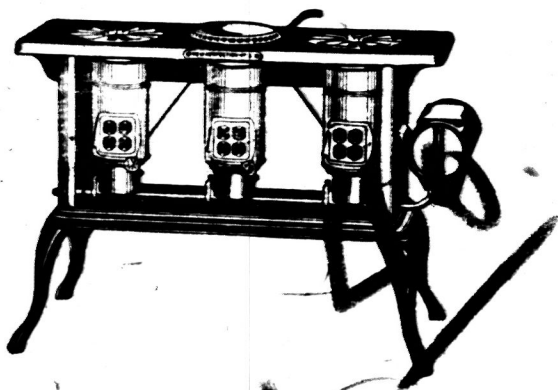

sent in the year 1794. Part of his journey was by water and he was obliged to go on shore for fifteen nights in succession and kindle a fire to keep off the wild beasts, and his food failing he was reduced to a cracker a day.

William Case says that he lost his health in the swamps of Canada, and for three months in 1806 his strength was wasted away by fever and ague.

Mr. Case says that five times he was laid low by fevers-bilious and and typhus. He had no home of his own, but he was cared for and nursed by the settlers he had come to minister to.

Once he was ship-wrecked on Lake Ontario, and five times he and his horse broke through the ice on the bays, rivers and lakes of Canada. Doesn't this make you think of St. Paul?

And so it went on. The spirit of endurance, enthusiasm and determination to carry on the work they had attempted, notwithstanding any difficulties and discouragements, kept them going, aided as these were by the help obtained in communion with their God. This was another chapter to be added to the Acts of the Apostles.
