Gentlemen:—Your Committee met at the Home and beg leave to report as follows:
During the month there has been one death, that of Mr. Timothy McMonaghan, of Caledonia. This makes a total of 35 inmates; 15 females and 20 males.
We are sorry to be unable to report any improvement in Mrs. Brown's condition. It is regrettable that Mrs. Brown has been so seriously ill, the Manager, Mr. Brown, has the farm and Home in excellent condition, and the committee take this opportunity of congratulating the Manager on this fact, which is brought about by the hearty co-operation of the inmates with the management.
We have examined the accounts of the Home and of the Children's Aid Society as presented and find them correct and in order, and would recommend same to the Finance Committee for payment.

A duet "Scenes from the Forest," played on two pianos by Dorothy and Agnes Roulston, aged 13 and 11 years, was well received and may also deserve a word of praise, as these were the two youngest performers. Miss Miell, in her own admirable style, gave two readings, and the solo by Miss Doris Kindree greatly delighted the audience.

On Saturday afternoon the Introductory and Primary class made their bow to a large audience, and while a few showed signs of "stage fright," the small people comported themselves most creditably and showed that a splendid foundation was being laid for more advanced work. Altogether, both Friday and Saturday programs were a decided success, and gave ample evidence of the painstaking and thorough manner in which the pupils have been trained, not only to render their musical selections in an effective way, but to make a splendid platform appearance. We cannot appreciate too highly the splendid work being done by Miss MacMurphy, and we certainly wish her a continuation of the success she so well deserves.
