This schedule does not provide for \$60,000.00 due to the Province for 1924 nor for a probable overdraft on good roads of \$25,000 for 1925 nor for \$36,000.00 borrowed from Bank of Commerce to pay Province on 1923 and we would recommend that near the end of the year debentures be sold to cover these amounts, approximately \$120,000.00.

Your Finance Committee recommend that grants of \$2,000 be made to each of the High Schools at Cayuga, Dunnville, Caledonia and Hagersville and \$400 each to the Continuation Schools at Jarvis and Selkirk.

Committee also recommends that the Warden and Treasurer be authorized to borrow \$45,000 from the Bank of Commerce for Good Roads purposes.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF GOOD ROADS COMMITTEE

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:
Gentlemen:—Your Good Roads Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. The paylists and accounts up to May 31st, 1925, have been checked over carefully and recommend that they be paid.

2. The month of May was very favorable for doing work on the County Highway System and it is expected that the end of June a very large percentage of the season's program will be completed.

3. The stone crushing plant installed in Mr. Kimmert's quarry, a short distance east of Rainham Centre, commenced crushing on the 5th of this month and are averaging eighty yards of crushed stone daily which will possibly be increased to one hundred yards in a short time.

4. The contract for constructing 3 re-inforced concrete culverts and 2 re-inforced concrete bridges on Road No. 24. Your committee would recommend that the tender of Mr. W. H. Lishman for \$3990.00 covering the five structures be accepted, work to commence not later than August 1st, 1925.
